Remar Blue Ministry to the Exodus Community

On Wednesday the 5th of September, our Remar Blue Rowers participated in a Group Ministry to the Exodus Community in Heidelberg West.

Formally the site of the 1956 summer Olympic Games that once accommodated athletes, the Exodus Community was established 13 years ago in response to growing socio-economic needs that emerged post the Olympics, after the village became a Housing Commission estate for low-income families.

Today, Exodus is home to many welfare-dependent families and individuals, including those suffering the isolation of mental illness, to those struggling with drug dependency, to refugees, to the unemployed and to elderly shut-ins. Many of the young people in the community are at great risk because of poverty, violence and lack of security, poor nutrition and hygiene, lack of opportunities for safe and healthy leisure activities and poor role modelling.

The Marist Brothers amongst other ministry groups entered the community to try and ease adversity by being a compassionate presence of church, by journeying with, listening and responding to the needs of the local people. The Marists strive to build strong positive community relationships and assist in a variety of ways, such as with advocacy, education, recreational activities, health and spiritual support.

Upon our arrival, we were greeted and welcomed into the community by Marist Br Harry Prout and students were given an introduction and tour of the community, its situation and needs.

Students then had a chance to sit and meet with some of the local people at a communal lunch, which is regularly hosted by the Brothers on a Wednesday. Our students were able to listen and learn from these people's stories, which really helped raise an awareness and further understanding around many significant social issues that some of our communities are currently faced with- namely poverty, mental health, unemployment, substance addiction, gambling and difficult family situations.

The students then had an opportunity to be of service by assisting one of the local women clean and tidy up her home.

We then concluded our day with prayer and by presenting Br Harry the homeless packages assembled by Lavalla students at the College's Winter Sleep-out, for redistribution among the community. Students spoke of their learnings and challenges from this experience and reflected on how they were "living as Christ's disciples" in what they did in this day.

Learning & Teaching

As we come to the end of Term 3 the students are looking forward to a well-earned break. For students in Years 7 to 11 Term 4 will continue to build upon their learning and completing assessments. For Year 12 Term 4 will be a short three weeks before exams start.

Trial & VCE Exams

Week 1 of Term 4 will commence with Trial Exams from 9-11 October. During this time students will have the opportunity to complete exams under full VCAA conditions and timing. This will provide students the chance to test their knowledge prior to the VCAA exams commencing on Wednesday 31 October. All students have received their full trial exam and VCAA exam schedule. The last day of Year 12 classes is Thursday 25 October.

It's not OK to be away

Attendance Requirement

In order to maximise student achievement and outcomes, Lavalla Catholic College requires students to be punctual and attend all classes with appropriate materials and set preparations completed so that teaching and learning can be effective.

The College Attendance Requirement is fully supported by the VCAA and Catholic Education Office and requires at least 90% attendance (face to face) in each Unit/subject to achieve an 'S' for that Unit/subject, regardless of whether or not the student has satisfied the coursework outcomes for that Unit/subject or not.

Approved absences are:

- Those covered by a Medical Certificate or other relevant documentation
- Those caused by the student's participation in another aspect of the College's educational program (such as Elite/Marist sport, music, excursion or camp)

Unapproved absences are:

- Absences not covered by a Medical Certificate or other relevant documentation
- An absence from a whole school activity
- Family holidays taken by students during the school term. Teachers are not responsible for, and may not provide work for students on holidays as this will lead to authentication concerns.

Special Provision and School Based Assessment

Students are eligible for Special provision for school-based assessment if they are adversely affected by illness, impairment or traumatic personal and/or family circumstances. The usual provision granted in this category may include allowing the student to undertake the task at a later date, allowing the student extra time to complete the task, substituting or replacing one task with another task or using technology to complete the task.

All these possible provisions will be dependent on the resources of the College.

If a child is away on a family holiday for an exam, assessment or SAC they will receive a zero for that task. This is because family holidays do not meet the requirement outlined above to qualify for Special Provision.

It is important that if you are planning on taking holidays during the school year you have a conversation/email your child's Learner Advisor or Homeroom Teacher, Wellbeing Leader or Senior School Co-ordinator to assess the full impact of the absence.

If the intention is that your child will be away from school longer than 5 days then a 'Leave of Absence' form needs to be completed. These can be collected from Student services at each campus.

Year 10 Geography Excursion

On Monday, 10th September the Year 10 Geography travelled to the Bunurong Marine Park for their first Geography field-trip on the term. Blessed with fine weather, the class began their studies at the Cape Paterson surf beach where they identified examples of erosional as well as depositional coastal landforms as well as the processes which led to the various

formations. Students were able to record their observations as well as log their photos on their Epicollect mobile phone App which were then downloaded in class.

As we drove along the coastline, we stopped at The Oaks, Twin Reefs as well as Eagle's Nest to observe and discuss other landforms. Our work at the Inverloch surf beach revealed

the dramatic impact which human induced climate change is having on the primary dune system and raised student awareness of the local impacts which this global phenomenon is having.

Special thank you to Ms Widrich for assisting me through-out the day as well as Greg Oowler, our bus driver for transporting us to all the locations. Students will now complete an extensive field report to demonstrate what they have learnt in class and along the coast on Monday.

Local Geography students excel in Australian Geography Competition

Over 40 Geography students from Years 10 to 12 tested their geographical skills and knowledge against students from all around Australia in the 2018 Australian Geography Competition. Over 70,000 students from 760 schools entered.

Geography teacher Mr Steve Erdely, has just received the results and was very pleased with how their students performed.

"This is the fifth year the college entered the competition with students completing the multiple choice paper under test conditions. Students performed to a high level with 2 students, Jack Walton and Rico Faurie in Year 11 receiving credits certificates whilst Ruby McCormick received a Distinction.

Congratulations also must go to Alice Peddle in Year 12 who received a credit certificate. Special mention to Ella Darling also in Year 12, who was awarded a High Distinction with only 3.83% of students across the country with a higher score!"

On Thursday 19th September, the two year 10 Business and Economics classes were given a marketing seminar by Matthew, the Marketing Manager from Aussie Broadband.

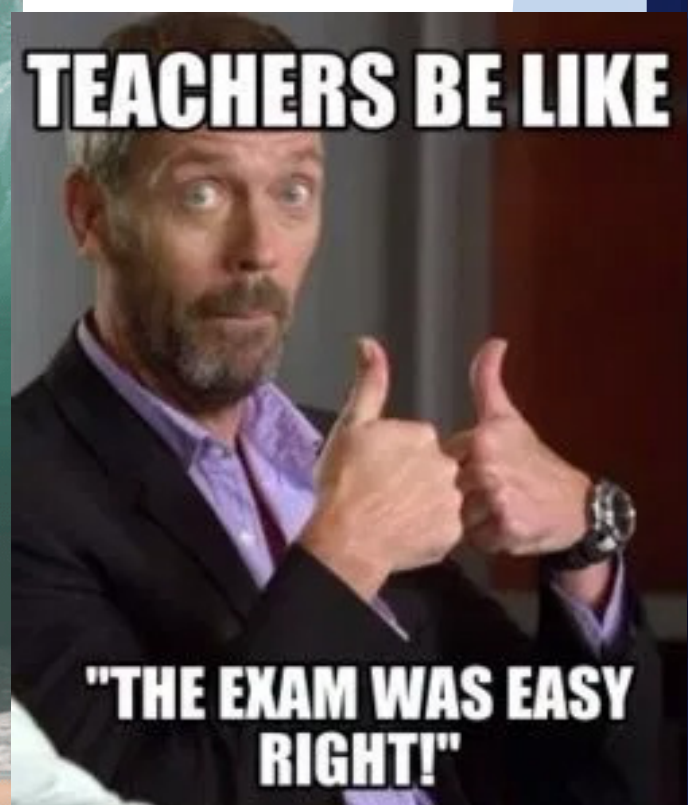
