From the Principal

Dear members of the Lavalla community

Mothers around the world represent a common sacred thread that binds and unites us all. It is something we all have in common and a mother's love expresses itself in countless ways every day. On Sunday as we celebrate our mothers, those still with us and those who have died, we can draw hope from a mother's incredible ability to shape the world around her both through her daily interactions with us and by the values she imparts. This week I share with you an inspiring article that connects a mother's love to the education of girls around the word and while its focus is on third world countries, the principles Erin Ganju speaks of apply internationally. She connects very strongly a mother's desire to improve her daughters' lot in life to the dream of a better life that education can bring:-

It is hard to dispute that gender disparity in education no longer exists when one realises that of the 793 million illiterate people in the world, two-thirds are female. Likewise, it would be difficult to challenge the importance of providing girls with an education, as we know that educating females is the most powerful and effective way to address global poverty. Educated mothers are more likely to educate their own children -- ending the cycle of illiteracy in one generation. What is perhaps less definitive is how best to tackle this issue. With many barriers facing girls in the developing world that go far beyond simple economics, including cultural bias, tradition and safety concerns, the answer is admittedly not simple. Yet, for many areas in the world, one of the answers may lie in the synergy of parental support and the support of women in their families and communities.

Parental involvement plays a paramount role in shaping girls' expectations for themselves and deciding how long they will remain in school...While of varying cultures, a common thread unites them all - a strong commitment to supporting their daughters' education. In Andhra Pradesh, India, a mother remarked, "I can now dream of my only daughter going for higher studies, getting a job and earning her own money. She won't have to live like us." In Siem Reap, Cambodia, a mother shared with me, "I am illiterate. I don't want her to have the same fate. I don't have an inheritance for her. I know only that knowledge will be a priceless and lifelong gift for her."

...It must be recognized, however, that in many countries, the sphere of parental influence is often extended to others, most often women. Grandmothers and aunts play an important role in ensuring that girls remain in school...This level of devotion is also reflected in the words of an aunt from Laos who remarked upon hearing that her niece would be part of our Girls' Education program, "When I heard Inkham was selected by Room to Read, I couldn't sleep. I felt as if I had won a kilogram of gold."

As another extension to familial influence, other women outside the family can serve as role models in the lives of young girls... some can serve as a personal advocate on their path to graduation from secondary school. This role may take many forms. In Bangladesh, it may include advocating against early marriage so that girls can remain in school longer. In

Zambia, it may include exploring an attendance issue that has resulted because the walk to school may be too dangerous or far. As members of the community themselves, our social mobilisers understand the pressures that these girls face and can serve to exemplify the educated, empowered women they may become one day.

As a mother of a six-year-old daughter, I have been humbled to witness the extraordinary lengths taken by parents and women in the communities around the world to ensure a girl's education, despite the odds. Oliver Wendell Holmes once said, "Youth fades; love droops; the leaves of friendship fall; a mother's secret hope outlives them all."

On this Mother's Day, I salute not only dedicated mothers everywhere, but all women who recognise that a mother's hope starts with education and devote a part of themselves every day to ensure this for the girls in their lives and communities. As Catholics and as Marists, we devote the month of May to Mary. Her faith and openness to God's will, inspires us to undertake new challenges and like mothers around the world who see that education can be a vehicle to improve one's life, we dedicate ourselves to improve the lives of all our students so that they may become good citizens and good Christians.


Rest in Peace



Lavalla Girls return to the Summit

Lavalla Catholic College has climbed to the top of the Marist Basketball mountain once again with the girl's team being able to exorcize their demons of the past three carnivals to win their ninth Marist Basketball Carnival.

Facing the rivalling Catholic College Sale, Lavalla laid the foundations of their victory through an exceptional first half to claim their first Championship win in four years with a 43-32 triumph.

After an even opening quarter, the girls dug deep with a solid defensive effort as Lavalla spurted to a 14-point half time lead (26-12) following a decisive 16-5 spree during the second period. The path to a Championship victory was momentarily obstructed as Sale turned up the intensity and managed to grind away at the deficit they faced.

Lavalla's early dominance on the game slowly evaporated with Sale showing more aggression and resolve to reduce the deficit back to 31-25 heading into the final period.

After Sale scored the opening basket of the final quarter to close within four points there was an eerie feeling lurking about the Runaway Bay stadium that Sale were about to storm the gates.

Instead, a pair of free throws by Casey Sheriff and some clutch shooting by Meghan Keast and Rebecca Jennings gave momentum back to Lavalla.

It was fitting that the girls Most Valuable Player for the Marist Carnival, Rebecca Jennings, would cap the game with the last points of the tournament.

It was great reward for three members of the team who were attending their last Carnival with the college.

Congratulations to coach Karen Joyce and all the players on their efforts in capturing the girl's title. Katelyn Somerville and Rebecca Jennings both received All-Star 5 selection and Rebecca was also named MVP of the carnival.

Alice Springs will host the 2013 Australian Marist Basketball Carnival with the students already looking forward to another fun-filled event.
