Dear Parents and Students

Teaching staff are currently busy finalising assessments and writing reports. Year 7 Museum Exhibits

The Year 7 students have been exhibiting their ancient Civilisations museum pieces. They have been studying Ancient Greece, Rome, Egypt and China. Each student has made some artefact from the civilisation the class studied as part of the learning task. With the help of their teacher, the students turned their classroom into a museum for a few periods. Students from other classes visited the classroom, looked at the displays and heard what the exhibitors had to say about the items. Every single class has had an excellent display. Congratulations to the teachers and students for their performance.

Youth Pathways

Youth Pathways is an Australian Government initiative. It is a program designed to assist 13 - 19 year old young people to make a smooth transition through school to the completion of Year 12, and from school to further education, training and/or employment.

Youth Services Officer, Suzanne Ryan, attends St Paul's once a week. She meets with students who have been referred to her by the teachers, with the permission of the parents. She deals with barriers to their education. She helps them set achievable goals and map their future focussed around their individual needs. She helps with resume writing, job skills and work habits.

She says, "I love the job. It is challenging, but rewarding. I like to hear students say that they are now enjoying school, that they understand the purpose of school and can create a successful future." It makes a difference.

Energizers

The energizers are a group of year 9 students. Recently they have met to organise a number of activities on the campus to improve student life. Ideas vary from Crazy Tie Days to a social at Inferno to Peer Mediation. One of the benefits of the meetings is to learn how to run meetings and the processing of planning an event successfully.

Exams are upon us. Our Year 12's now have the opportunity to put into practice what they have learnt over the semester. Their previous years of education is where their habits were formed.
