Dear Parents,

Teachers at Lavalla Catholic College have always been generous in their willingness to contribute to the development of our profession. Working on various committees or opening the classroom door to contribute to educational research can be challenging and holds with it an element of risk. Teachers place themselves in the position of being a learner as well as educationalist. This can take various forms. Firstly, I'd like to acknowledge the influential work of Mrs Anne Wilson (VCAL); Mrs Rita Nainie and Ms Natalia Nadsadina (CAS Mathematical Methods) and Ms Samantha Black (Mathematical Methods) for their sustained efforts in contributing to the state review bodies in those subject areas. As one teacher mentioned to me this week, "we keep trying new things and we keep learning how to teach more effectively, simply so that our students can regain or build on their confidence, so that they *want to learn*".

Uniform

I would like to thank the parents and students who attend to the uniform requirement as conscientiously as they do. It is by far the greater majority.

Wearing a uniform helps give students a sense of belonging to the College. It assists in encouraging pride in ourselves and in the College we represent. It sharpens student focus on schoolwork emphasises that the College focus is also on learning and not on making fashion statements. It can minimise unhelpful comparisons among students and promote a better climate for learning. A uniform also allows us to identify outsiders quickly and easily, which promotes better security on Campus.

Parents have spent a lot of money in buying the uniform and we believe that it is important that we support parents who are supporting us by purchasing the uniform. After all, it was the parents who originally wanted a College Uniform, including, in the last four years, the Blazer. Blazers, kilts and trousers, jumpers and rugby tops, PE Uniforms, shoes and runners are all very expensive individual items and I know of parents who have made significant personal sacrifices to ensure that their children have the correct uniform. This is why we devote so much time and effort to make sure that the uniform is correctly worn. Parent support in this is greatly appreciated.

So, by way of clarification, at the Assembly last week, I made the following points:

- 1. Students are expected to wear the complete uniform to and from school and to wear the complete uniform to homeroom. This includes the Blazer, unless students are entitled to wear the PE uniform, e.g. Thursdays and PE days.
- 2. The uniform is not mixed and matched.
- 3. The College Blazer is compulsory for all students in Years 10, 11 and 12. If students wish to remove the Blazer after homeroom, they may put their Blazer in their locker during the day but are expected to put it back on again to go home.
- 4. The Blazer is the normal school wear during the months of April to October. It is not required in the first and fourth terms. It is worn on all formal occasions e.g. Opening Mass, Champagnat Day Mass, Photos, etc. and is also worn when students are representing the College e.g. some excursions or team sports events.
- 5. The Year 12 Rugby Top does not replace the Blazer but takes place of the grey, College jumper.
- 6. A plain Navy Blue Jacket may be worn over the PE uniform in cold weather. This does not replace the Blazer.

Students who do not have a blazer at this point are asked to be measured, to place an order and to purchase it from Riggalls as soon as possible, please. There are quite a large number of second hand blazers of all sizes in the Uniform Shop at the St. Paul's Campus. Students without blazers at the Kildare Campus are asked to purchase one from the secondhand Uniform Shop (see information below re secondhand uniform shop).

Confiscated Items of Clothing

Mrs Clarke has a number of T-shirts, wind-cheaters, jackets, scarves, etc. that are not part of the College uniform. Some have been in her office for over twelve months. Students are asked to collect any confiscated items from her before the Queen's Birthday week-end. After that date, the items will be donated to St. Vincent de Paul.
