Within the next month, we will install solar panels that will produce electricity for use at this campus and sell any excess electricity to the grid. This is so that we can play our part in trying to slow the rate of global warming by reducing the amount of carbon dioxide released to the atmosphere. Global warming is already causing big problems for the planet, with glaciers and sea ice disappearing, sea levels rising, severe droughts in inland Australia and all sorts of climate change in various parts of the world leading to extinctions of endangered animal species.

The school will also use this system to teach about alternative forms of energy and will be one of the key features of the school gaining "sustainable schools" accreditation.
