From the Principal

Dear members of the Lavalla community

I am delighted to let you know that our principal, Erica, has come through her surgery very well. She will spend the rest of this year on sick leave but should be returning to the College in the new year. Once again, thank you all for your expressions of concern, well wishes and prayers which have buoyed Erica during this time.

Victorian Registration and Qualification Authority audit

This audit took place across all three campuses and was conducted by a panel of four. I am pleased to report that the preliminary feedback was very positive and found much strength within the College. I am most grateful to Suzanne Farley and Claire Couling who lead our curriculum area, for their management of this audit. I am also grateful to the teaching staff for their on-going work in developing and delivering exciting and challenging curriculum. Like all continual improvement processes the final report will help us move forward in this area.

Strategic Plan

There has been considerable work done on the strategic plan for the next five years with numerous meetings and discussions. We will be using the draft of this to form our plans for the 2013 and will launch the final Strategic plan in 2013. This also forms part of the auditing process that the College has undergone this year.

Remembrance Day

Our understanding of this day has broadened over the years and it is a day we now set aside to remember those who have died in all wars. On the 11th hour, of the 11th day of the 11th month, we pause and offer our thoughts and prayers to those who died in wars or those who returned from war to lives that were forever different because of the horrors they had experienced. We acknowledge a huge debt of gratitude to those Australians who suffered and sacrificed so much. It is always poignant for me to see images of our own students commemorating the day, and realising that in another time or place these fine young people could have been in uniform and fighting for their very lives. Lest we forget.

Head Start

Years 10 and 11 students finish their exams this week, and will launch into the Head Start Program next week. For our dedicated students this is a wonderful opportunity to start preliminary work on subjects so that 2013 can be as productive as possible. I am most grateful to the staff members who schedule and facilitate this program. Year 9 students moving to Year 10 next year will have an opportunity to experience the program in early December.

Year 7 Centre

As mentioned in the previous newsletter we are beginning a refurbishment of this area. Currently two classes have been removed from the eastern end and preliminary work has already started. Hopefully this will be completed for the start of the 2013 school year. The western end will be refurbished during term 2 when rooms will become available elsewhere on the Campus as Year 9 students will be involved in MSP. This will also give all Year 7s adequate time to settle into College life before disrupting their routine.

The changes in this area will reflect the latest educational thinking and research which moves us away from what is known as the Industrial model, where one teacher attends to one class and into a model that enables collaborative learning and teaching. Consequently the walls of the classrooms will literally come down as we develop more flexible spaces for students and teachers to work in.

Doug will be taking up the role of Kildare Campus Director in 2013. In anticipation of this and to enable him to learn more about our College and region, he will be visiting from November 26th - 30th. This will enable him to meet staff at the Kildare campus, get to know his team leaders and familiarise himself with the area. There may be opportunities for him to meet families at events like the Christmas concert and I hope you take the opportunity to welcome him warmly to our community.

Royal Commission

There has been a great deal in the media regarding the Royal Commission into child abuse, the Catholic Church has been singled out for particular attention. The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference has released a statement supporting this Commission and acknowledging that "This is a serious issue not just for the Catholic Church but for the whole community." While the Commission does its work it is important to remember and support the many good men and women who work in our midst. I think of our local priests who work tirelessly with the dying, marginalised, elderly and mentally ill and I hope that they will not feel unappreciated or even spurned because of the acts of others.

As we move towards final activities it is important that our young people are reminded to express gratitude to those who have helped them throughout the year. To express thankfulness and appreciation for the work of the administration, maintenance and canteen staff and to acknowledge the work and dedication of their teachers has two benefits. Asking your son or daughter to reflect on who has helped and how they can acknowledge this, could make for a very fruitful family discussion.

Healesville Sanctury



I congratulate them for their efforts throughout the nomination period and I look forward to working with them throughout 2013 in support of our Campus activities.

Subject Allocations and Changes



SPORTS REPORT

CRICKET

Lavalla's Intermediate boys' cricket team advanced through to the State Finals of the Super 8's competition after winning the Regional Finals played at the Sydney Parageter Reserve in Endeavour Hills on Thursday, November 8th.

The boys' team encountered a bye in the opening round of the Regional Finals but met their opening match against Elizabeth Murdoch College, Langwarrin with great enthusiasm.

Batting first, Lavalla went about their business very aggressively and were in fine form to rack up 178 runs off their eight overs. It was a good score to defend and they bundled out Langwarrin for 89.

The second round match against Beaconhills College, Pakenham again had Lavalla batting first and while they didn't find the same rhythm as in their opening contest they still rattled on 115 runs. The bowling form and fielding efforts were pleasing as they bowled out Pakenham for 62.

Two wins and a bye placed them in the Final against Minaret College, Springvale and Lavalla continued their form with the bat to give Springvale a total of 120 runs to chase. The boys again performed in the field when needed and defended their total with a consistent bowling effort to restrict their opponents to 95.

They will now travel to the Melbourne Cricket Ground on Thursday, November 29th in their endeavour to claim the Super 8's State Title for 2012.

The Intermediate girls' team were not as fortunate as the boys but performed to the standard that almost enabled them to advance to the State Finals as well.

Lavalla scored a narrow 97-94 win over Wonthaggi Secondary College in their opening match and then blasted Lowanna College, Newborough to all parts of the field to record a 128-73 victory.

However, as the day wore on the girls lost their appetite for the contest and could only muster 75 runs in their final round match against Lakeside Lutheran College,

Pakenham. Pakenham were a solid fielding outfit and our girls struggled to find runs. Our run-chase fell short by 20 runs as we were defeated 95-75.

The girls eventually succumbed to fourth place overall after being defeated by Alkira Secondary College, Cranbourne North. Wonthaggi Secondary College, whom we defeated in our first game if the day were eventual winners on the day.

What is pilgrimage?

A pilgrimage is a personal spiritual experience. World Youth Days have instigated a renewal of the practice of going on pilgrimage, especially for young people. This is often an experience of joyful discovery not only of wonderful places but also of the universal church in great beauty, particularly when shared with others.

In ancient times pilgrims travelled by sailing ships, horses and even on foot. They risked getting diseases or being robbed or enslaved. They sometimes faced the possibility of never returning. They travelled in 'faith'.

Today, pilgrims do not face the same perils as in ancient times. Planes and fast trains, modern law and order have made traversing long distances far more comfortable and speedy. Yet, one element remains,

namely that a pilgrimage is a spiritual journey. The elements of generosity, adaptability, flexibility and a positive attitude are all primary requisites for the joyful conclusion to all travel. To be recollected in thought is vital.

Leave your problems at home.
Centre on what you are seeing,
hearing, and reading while on
pilgrimage. Prayer is essential. It
is the human means of
communication with the Lord.
Talk to Him. Ask Him to help you
to be open to receive whatever
He may wish to give you on your
pilgrimage.

A pilgrimage should be an experience, not just a list of places and things to see and do.

Much of what you will receive from your pilgrimage will depend on you and how well you have prepared yourself for this special journey within and without.

Beads & mantras

Throughout the world's many religions, including Catholicism, mantras have an important place in prayer & meditation. A mantra is a word or phrase that one repeats while meditating. The repetition occupies the body allowing the mind & spirit to pray more completely. When praying the rosary, the Hail Marys become a mantra.

Beads are also used in other world religions besides Catholicism. For example, Muslims use a set of 99 beads. Each bead represents a name for God in the Islamic faith. These beads become a kind of mantra for the hands.

In praying the rosary, the beads help one keep count of the Our Fathers & Hail Marys. But the beads also help the person engage the entire body in prayer. Through the repetition of the mantra and the handling of the beads, a person's body, mind & spirit are active & can enter more deeply into the mysteries of Jesus' life.

Praying with icons

As beings with five senses, we must use those senses to appreciate things fully. Focusing on icons is an ancient form of prayer that encourages our sense of sight. Icons have been part of the Christian tradition for centuries.

An icon is a religious image, usually of Christ, but also of Mary, or the saints painted primarily on wood. Icons are not simply religious art; they are a way into contemplative prayer and are therefore one way to let God speak to us. Icons are carefully painted by an iconographer according to exact and ancient rules about colour and design. The piece of wood

itself is not sacred; rather the one portrayed in the image (who dwells in heaven) is sacred.

Icons serve as a window into heaven, connecting us with God, as well as a window from heaven to earth, allowing us an intimate connection with God.

The way to pray with an icon is by gazing. As we gaze, the icon begins to speak and to reveal its scared meaning. Praying with icons is another way to present ourselves to Christ or the saints. It is a tool of prayer, helping us to focus on the holy.

The Luminous Mysteries

Twenty mysteries are reflected in the rosary; including the five luminous mysteries:

- The baptism of the Lord: John the Baptist baptises Jesus
- The Wedding at Cana: At Mary's request, Jesus turn water into wine
- The proclamation of the Gosel: Jesus announces that he was sent to bring Good News—liberty & favour from the Lord
- The Transfiguration: Peter, James & John see Jesus transfigured. His face becomes as dazzlingly bright as the sun.
- The Institution of the Eucharist: Jesus shared with his Apostles the meal that perpetuates his earthly presence.

Praying the rosary:

- 1. Make the sign of the cross & pray the Apostles' Creed.
- 2. Pray the Lord's Prayer.
- 3. Pray 3 Hail Marys.
- 4. Pray the Glory Be.
- 5. Announce the 1st mystery, then pray the Lord's Prayer.
- 6. Pray 10 Hail Marys while meditating on the mystery.
- 7. Pray the Glory Be.
- 8. Announce the 2nd mystery, then repeat the prayers of the 1st mystery. Continue with the 3rd, 4th, & 5th mysteries in the same manner.
- 9. After the 5th mystery , pray the Hail Holy Queen.
