## From the Principal

On Monday, August 15, we held prayer liturgies on each campus to celebrate the Feast of the Assumption. This Feast of the Assumption of Mary originated in Jerusalem before the fifth century as the 'Falling-Asleep of the Mother of God.' It was adopted in Rome in the mid-seventh century and was renamed the 'Assumption' in the next century. It celebrates Mary's passing over, body and soul, from this world into the glory of her risen Son.

As well as all the Sundays of the year, the solemnities of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ are the only other holydays of obligation for Catholics in Australia. However, we also took time at each campus to gather and prayer because Mary is very significant for Marists. As I wrote about a month back Marcellin Champagnat and eleven other young men took a pledge at Fourvière, Lyon in 1816 to dedicate their lives to beginning a new religious order of Mary-ist. We see Mary as a model to live our lives. She is the First Disciple, a woman of faith, who trusted in the Lord even though she did not know what challenges that trust would present. Mary, upon hearing of her cousin Elizabeth's pregnancy went "in haste" to the hill country to attend another's need. For all of us she is a the perfect example of what it is to be a person who seeks to serve others and make the world better- by meeting others where they are.

We wish Emily Beecroft the best of success in all her events at the upcoming 2016 Summer Paralympics in Rio.

#### **Academic Review**

Teachers have prepared student feedback which will be available via the Family Portal on Monday. Because of our regular reporting cycle it is simple to see how your son or daughter is travelling academically. In conjunction with the reporting we also have an Academic Review Process for those students who are at risk. This process assures that students do not get so far behind that they feel hopeless and unable to catch up. The power of the Academic Review Process is that there is close parental involvement. Common sense and research tells us that where parents are focused on their child doing well and engage with the school to assist in improving the learning, the child will generally progress. If you are invited to an Academic Review meeting it is imperative that you set the time aside to work through the process with your child and the teachers involved. In extreme cases where students have not been able to demonstrate satisfactory learning to complete a year level, they are asked to remain at school at the end of the year to complete tasks which demonstrate their suitability for study at the next year level.

To give you an idea of what these young people achieved... They have jobs. They study. They are part of the Music programme, Volunteer Firefighters, Leadership at school. They have gone on Immerison to Fiji. They do many things.

In addition, they began Remar Red (Yr 10- 2014) with 17 rowers and they finish Gold as 8 (Year 12- 2016) After a 3-year journey. Over the three years they have grown personally (emotionally, socially, spiritually etc). They have shown commitment, goodness, openness and generosity, perseverance; they have managed the many difficult times and celebrated the many good times. Most of all they have formed a community that includes rowers across Australia.

Personally, they have completed more than 70 hours of Community Service, attended 60 meetings (in their own time), gone on Solidarity go Melbourne, gone on 6 retreats with other schools, been good ambassadors for the college, got involved in various ministry and outreach programs, helped out in school. They are doers with a purpose.

Their journey has had many ups and many downs, but they have learned to deal with life individually and as a close-knit group. #### Year 10 Retreats



# **Sport News**

t has been a busy term three in sport at Lavalla Catholic College with various teams qualify through to the State Championship of their respective fields of competition.

#### Basketball

The Divisional Championships commenced this term and we had our Intermediate girls advance through to the Regional Championships with a strong showing at Traralgon Sports Stadium on July 15th.

On August 11th, our year year 7 and year 8 teams in the boys and girls competitions also won through to the Regional Championships to be played in Moe in October.

In the Champions Cup, our intermediate girls failed to overcome some quality talent and managed to record one win in their three games. The junior boys displayed some polished class and registered three solid wins to advance to the final eight of the competition.

## **Cross Country**

n July 14th the College had a strong contingent of cross country athletes attend the State Championships.

Riley Evans produced a fantastic performance to finish 2nd in the 15 year boys event in a time of 8.57, while teammates Tyler Morley (32nd), Colby Morley (40th), Archie Grant (47th) and Flynn Shields (80th) helped the overall team to a third place finish.

Monique Lapenta, in a time of 11.14, was another strong performer for the College to finish 15th in the 13 year girls event. The team of Isabella Bettridge (80th), Chelsea Lawn (88th) and Summah Gardiner (92nd) accomplished a team placing of seventh.

Other athletes to attend were Hugh Dunbar who finished 42nd in the 13 year boys event and Jack Murray who came 74th in the 14 year boys event.

#### Aust. Football

Our senior and junior girl's teams qualified for the Quarter Finals after winning through at the Regional Championships. Unfortunately our senior girls withdrew from the quarter finals due to lack of numbers and the junior girls were defeated by Mount Waverley, 6.6 (42) to 3.5 (23).

The intermediate boys, year 8 boys and year 7 boys all competed at the Regional Championships and they all missed advancing through to the quarter finals by percentage.

#### Netball

Our year 7 girls and the senior and junior boys have advanced through to the State Championships of the SSV competition after surviving tough competition at the Regional Championships.

All three girls' teams that competed in the Netball Victoria Schools Championships have advanced through to the finals day in the preliminary round in July.

Soccer

The strong contingent of soccer teams has enabled a number of teams to qualify through to the State Championships again with a likely State Champion to eventuate.
