Dear Parents,

<u>Forgiveness</u> is a defining characteristic of Christianity and this week in our Lenten Readings we have been invited to reflect on the importance of forgiveness in our daily lives. We have an obligation to forgive and release those who have offended us. Sometimes we can avoid forgiveness, emphasize our status as victims and use it to gain sympathy or to explain why we act as we do. Lack of forgiveness really doesn't do much for us and those who fail to forgive will never be free and never learn to live from the heart.

So how does Lavalla Catholic College reconcile the demand for forgiveness and the need to respond appropriately to student misbehaviour?

Some misbehaviour carries a standard penalty and once students fulfil this requirement the matter is over. It is a bit like a traffic fine. Once paid, the lesson is assumed to be learnt and the matter is over. Whilst we don't have a formal "demerit system" we do become aware of repeat offenders who haven't learnt the lesson and there could well be some consequences. All this is done in a fair and kindly way and students are encouraged to learn from their experience.

Where the offence is against persons, either student or teacher, the process is a bit more involved and that involves reconciliation with the person offended so that those involved can continue working and living together.

Sometimes when the offence is of a serious nature, there is much discussion and the consequences are more significant. This helps the student to appreciate the inappropriateness of what they have done, to understand the causes of their misbehaviour and to undertake to avoid any repetition. Once this is achieved the student is welcome to return and to resume healthy relationships with everyone. Whilst we do not use the term forgiveness, it is clear that the students who offend and face the consequences are forgiven and are able to return, having learnt the lesson we were trying to teach them.

So the culture of forgiveness enables the disciplinary process to be completed without any vindictiveness or feelings of no longer being trusted.

PROJECT COMPASSION

Each year, Lent offers us the opportunity to think outside of ourselves, to look upon 'the other', to share what we have with those who have less. In 2003, Project Compassion raised over 6 million dollars. The generosity of ordinary Australians enabled Caritas Australia to do so much to help so many people in need around the world.

In 2004, the theme for Project Compassion is 'Building Peace, Bringing Hope'. It has been estimated that throughout the twentieth century at least 180 million people have died as a direct result of war. There are currently as many as 24 wars being waged throughout the world. Significantly, the majority of wars today are civil wars.

"If you only knew today what was needed for peace. But you cannot see it." (Luke 19:42)

The need for peace is evident and we all have a role to play in building peace. We all long for peace – peace in our families, our schools, our workplaces, our parishes, our local communities, our nation and our world. But what do we mean when we call for peace; when we march for peace; when we pray for peace?

The students on the St Paul's campus have taken seriously the call to build peace and during the Ash Wednesday ceremony signally the start of Lent they signed a 'Covenant of Compassion'. The commitment certificate reads, "The school community of St Paul's Campus stands in solidarity with the world's poorest people. We promise to support Project Compassion this Lent. We promise to share what we have and to act for justice and peace in all that we do."

Among our many projects, Caritas Australia would like to help:

- The people of the **Solomon Islands** as they rebuild their lives after the violence
- The people of Uganda as they overcome war and poverty
- The people of **Papua New Guinea** who are building peace following tribal fighting
- Indigenous Australians as they work for the preservation of their culture
- The people of **East Timor** as they continue to rebuild their lives
- The people of **Bangladesh** as they strive to break free from poverty

As we continue to challenge unjust structures that bind people to a life of poverty and as we seek to become involved in building peace, may we realise that "to be authentic Christians, we need to take justice wherever we go; we need to

take peace wherever we go." (Cardinal Rodriguez of Honduras)
