Dear parents and students

This week the parable of the Good Samaritan comes to mind. It is a well known story of our Christian faith where a Jewish man was travelling from Jerusalem to Jericho and was beaten up by a group of robbers who left him to die. Passers by, a Levite and a priest – friends of the Jews, left him to die and it was the Samaritan who came to his aid. To understand the significance of this story we need to know that the Jews held Samaritans in disregard and practiced open hostility towards them. Yet it is the Samaritan – the most unlikely of the characters in this parable that offers a helping hand.

It was reported last week that an Asian woman who had just left work to bank the day's takings was attacked in the car park by a man. Her screams for help were heard by a number of people standing near by and remarkably none went to her aid or called for the police. Traces of her blood and hair were eventually found at the scene and after an extensive air and road search, she was found dead in the boot of her car. An Asian man was later arrested.

Then there was the story of Lincoln Hall, the Australian mountain climber left for dead just below the summit of Mt Everest. Fortunately, he was discovered by some Sherpas who helped him to safety. Not so lucky was the British climber, David Sharp, who was left to die on Mt Everest on his own, while a number of climbers passed him by as they continued on their assent.

Aren't these stories in strong contrast to the sense of community and hope we experienced with the rescue of our Tasmanian miners? So why have people behaved so differently in these situations? Is it to do with our own self-centeredness? Was getting to the top of the mountain more important than assisting a dying human being?

Is it that we do not want to get involved in helping someone who is being violently attacked, for fear of our own discomfort or has our attitude of *not interfering* in others' business gone too far? Why do we do nothing when we hear a woman scream for assistance or take no action when we know we are being called to lend a helping hand? As we examine these stories each of us would surely hope that should we be in need, there would be a Good Samaritan coming to our aid?

Jesus' teaches and calls us not to be self-centred but other-centred. The prayer of St Francis brings to mind this call

Lord,
Make me an instrument of your peace.
Where there is hatred...let me sow love,
Where there is injury...pardon,
Where there is doubt...faith,
Where there is despair...hope,
Where there is darkness...light,
Where there is sadness...joy.
