These last two weeks have seen students and staff focused on exam preparation and completion. For the Yr 10 students last week was the first time they have sat exams in a formal examination environment. Considerable work goes into the exam paper writing, hall set up, supervision and exam correction. We believe all this work is vital for the Yr 10 students to become familiar with 'sitting exams' which is a skill in its own right and certainly improves a student's chances of receiving good marks in Yr 11 and 12 exams. Likewise with Yr 11 students who spent last week involved in the exam process or learning to manage their time without class contact.

#### YR 12 UNIT 3/4 EXAMS

This week Yr 12s face midyear exams and the General Assessment Task. Thanks to Mrs Kath Beckett, the exam supervisor, who spoken to the students last week to help prepare them. This can be a time of some stress and anxiety for students. Parents can often feel helpless at the sidelines. Some of the best things you can do are to work with your son or daughter to ensure that they are: Eating properly: healthy snacks, limit caffeine, regular nutritious meals, limit sugary drinks, plenty of water and a protein rich breakfast on the day of exams.

Sleeping properly: regular bed times and wake up times; adolescents need at least 8 hours sleep to function properly. There should be some 'down time' between study and bed.

Organising properly: Help your son/ daughter by talking through the tasks they have, and establish reasonable time frames. Help them break down the tasks into manageable pieces. Study environment: Find a space that is conducive to study, if they are finding it difficult to stay motivated-change spaces; try a different room, the local library etc. Study should also involve periods of silence (usually at least 20 mins) where the student can focus intently. Be patient, your young person may be very focused on themselves, continue to involve them in family activities, help them maintain a positive balance, but understand they may be distracted.

#### **YR 12 RETREATS**

Next week the Yr 12 students have the opportunity to recover from their exams and Work Experience by attending the Retreat. We will operate at two locations, Yarram and Licola. The retreats give the students valuable time to attend to their spiritual and personal growth after what has been a hectic period. These experiences are highly valued by the College and the students who attend. It is disappointing to note that a very small number of parents support their children in not participating in the retreat. We do not view these experiences as optional and all families agreed to be involved in College activities at the time of enrolment. My thanks to the staff who will lead the activities and my best wishes to the students who participate.

#### WORK EXPERIENCE

Thanks to Mrs English for facilitating the latest round of Work Experience. This provides vital learning opportunities for many students and ofers employers a chance to get to know young people prior to employment. I hope that this year's students are doing their part to contribute to Lavalla's reputation with employers i.e. being punctual, well presented, enthusiastic and appreciative of the opportunity.

## **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY NEWS** By Mr Ben Verghese - Manager Information Technology

#### APPROPRIATE USE OF THE COLLEGE EMAIL SYSTEM

The College provides all students and staff with email access to allow for communication about teaching and learning. With the growth of online resources, it is now important that all students have a computer account on the College network that allows them access to emails from teachers and access to other electronic resources. Parents who are familiar with emails at home would be well aware of SPAM email. Fortunately, all of this external SPAM is filtered and students are not exposed to such emails from outside the College. However, we have a small number of students who are generating "nuisance" emails to large groups of students and staff, and this is regarded as SPAM email. Each email generated requires storage space on the College servers and when students send such "nuisance" emails to large groups, this guickly consumes valuable disk space on the College servers. This disk space is needed for other important College services and resources.

The College policy is to disable any student's computer account if they are the senders of such "nuisance" emails or if they are in breach of any other aspect of the computer use policy as outlined in the student planner. When a computer account has been disabled, the student cannot access important electronic resources needed for his/her classes and this will act to inconvenience the student. This inconvenience is a direct consequence of the actions of the student in not respectingtheproperuse of resources that the College provides. We are charging students a nominal fee of \$20 (which will be forwarded to the Missions) to re-enable student's account. any computer This nominal fee is far less than the actual labour cost involved in freeing up disk space, and is charged as a deterrent to re-offend. However, if such a fee does not have the effect of stopping the unwanted behaviour, the student's computer account will be disabled until we can be re-assured that such unwanted behaviour will not re-occur. It is important that the student's computer account be reenabled as quickly as possible in order for the student to continued access to the teaching and learning program

#### APPROPRIATE CARE OF LAPTOPS PROVIDED TO KIL-DARE STUDENTS

Parents of students on the Kildare Campus will be aware that each student has been provided with a laptop to use during the day. We are currently experiencing some damage that is beyond what can be termed as accidental. This damage is due to students leaving the laptop unattended on top of lockers or in classrooms and not securing their laptops in their lockers when they are not using them. Students have been asked to secure their laptops inside their lockers during recess and lunch breaks, and to take responsibility for their care in each lesson.

Students who allow their laptop to be unattended will need to accept responsibility for the cost of damage, especially when this damage is not recoverable under ordinary insurance claims. For a laptop that initially costs \$1500, this repair can be quite expensive. I am alerting parents about the need to pass on such costs where this is deemed appropriate and for you to remind your son/daughter of the large costs that arise from the lack of care and responsibility. The College has provided secure lockers for storage during the day and also secure storage at the end of each day in the Learner Advisor room. Student's use of a laptop is no longer optional with many teachers making use of electronic resources to assist with teaching and learning, and the use of such expensive items is needed. So we are asking your assistance to impress on your son/daughter to assist us to look after equipment.
