Remar

On Saturday the 12th of March our Blue Remar Caravel made up of nine year 11 students embarked on their Solidarity Camp to Santa Teresa NT. Santa Teresa, also known as Ltyentye Apurte is a Catholic Aboriginal Community that is situated about 85 kilometres south-east of Alice Springs. This immersion experience offered our students the opportunity to: explore and experience issue relating to social justice within the community; actively take part in practical projects for the benefit of the community; and build upon their understanding of humility, loyalty and solidarity as they lived out these Gospel Values through their work and experiences.

Natalie Justin says:

Going to Santa Teresa (Lytente Apurta) for the Remar Solidarity Camp is an experience I will never forget. It was a week full of emotional and spiritual moments. We had the opportunity to work in the Community Centre where local women committed their time to making and delivering food to the elderly members of the community. In the Spirituality Centre we helped varnish some of the incredible traditional artwork that is handmade by the local women of the community. The School Canteen was loads of fun as we got to see what school was like in these communities and got to play with the kids. It was a jam packed week full of activities but everything was 100% worth it.

I am very lucky to have received this life changing opportunity and without Remar I would never have been able to have this experience.

Callim Janda explains:

Having the chance to work in the Men's Shed for two days was a great experience. We got to work closely with members of the local community to help build furniture that was then donated to areas of need within the community or sold to help support the Shed. It was really rewarding to get to know some of the workers at the Shed and hear some of their background stories while being immersed in a work environment where the main language spoken was Arrernte – the native language of the local people.

Eily Dalton said:

It was such a privileged and humbling opportunity for our group to be allowed to participate in a traditional Smoking Ceremony. The purpose of the ceremony was to cleanse and heal and it was a spiritual experience for each us. Following this Sr Liz spoke with us at great length about the history and culture of the Arrernte people, deepening our understanding, appreciation and respect for these people and the land.

Olive Fitzpatrick reminisced:

On Wednesday afternoon we all piled into a troopie and, accompanied by Br Paul, headed out for dinner in the 'outback'. Our first job when we arrived at the site was to collect enough first wood to last us into the evening. After the fire was lit and Bonnie had declared herself the 'Fire Master', our pre-prepared spaghetti bolognaise and baked potatoes were heating up and we were making our way up the nearby hill to watch the sun set. The landscape was spectacular as the sun set on the horizon and the sky way amazing to see on such a clear night. I am so glad that we got to share this experience as a group.

Samantha Hegarty recounts:

It was so much fun going to the local swimming pool to help the younger students from the school with their swimming lessons. The students were really well behaved and were eager to let us help them. It was really interesting to see the respect the students and teachers had for one another and the way they learnt from each other. The afternoon ended with some free time in the pool where the students could show off their diving to us and enjoyed having our full attention.

It was with a heavy heart and great reluctance that the group departed Santa Teresa on Friday the 18th of March on their journey home. Careers

"A career is all of the paid and unpaid work, learning and life roles you do throughout your life. It encompasses jobs and training, life roles, education, hobbies, sport, cultural activities, volunteering, clubs and community"

The start of term 2 has been very busy with Careers related activities for Kildare students. Year 11's have had the opportunity to participate in faculty based activities at Federation University, with 3 more Thursdays trips to Federation University still to go out.

On the 29th of April Year 12's will attend their Tertiary Information Session to be held at Federation University. Year 11's will have an opportunity to attend the VCE and Careers Expo at Caulfield Racecourse on May 6th and/or attend a trip to explore 3 universities in Melbourne on June 14th.

190 of our Year 10 students are currently out in the community completing work experience. Teachers have been visiting these students and have reported a high level of engagement and interest in the work they are doing. Work experience is a unique experience. It is designed to help students learn about how expectations in the work force differ from the school environment as well as identify their own strengths and weaknesses. It is also an opportunity for students to gain some insight into the occupation and industry that they are placed in.

Lavalla parents were lucky to have the opportunity to participate in a workshop, presented by the CEO of Careers Education Association of Victoria, Bernadette Gigliotti, on Friday 15th of April.

We were the only Catholic school in Victoria able to secure this workshop which was funded by the State government. We also had the highest participation rate of any of the workshops held to date.

Parents were able to work through topics such as how to identify where their child is, on their career journey, given strategies to support their children at each stage as well as made more aware of what resources are out there to assist them and their children in the choices they will make in the future.



A key understanding delivered during the workshop was that planning for the future is not as simple or clear cut as it was when we were in high school. The world is changing at a much faster rate, the concept of one job or one career area 'for life' is not sustainable as jobs disappear and new jobs are 'invented' in very short spaces of time.

Think how fast the world of 'Apps' has come about. In the space of 5 years they have been invented and many millionaires have emerged from their work in the field. There certainly wasn't a university course being offered 5 years ago on how to build an 'app' or make a career out of it. This is likely to be our students experience — we are trying to prepare them for jobs that have not yet been invented yet but may be by the time their finish a three year post school course or they are undertaking studies in areas that are just not going to grow in employment opportunities in the future.

Some key messages from the work shop:

- Don't focus on one destination only
- Know what you want, but don't be too sure
- Be open to changing your mind
- Recognise that your career journey will be throughout your lifetime
- Appreciate and value each experience along the way
- Career development is a lifelong journey (not just about what will I once leaving school)
- Be flexible
- Change is constant
- Be aware of the digital and people resources that can help guide you along your journey.



School News

Legal Studies



Towards the end of last term the Unit 3 Legal Studies class took a trip to Melbourne to see how the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) works and also to observe the County Court processes. We were accompanied by Mrs. Karen Mc. Kay. We left at 7.15 from Kildare and arrived at the VCAT building by 9.40.

The students were given an explanation of how VCAT works and a demonstration with a mock case with the students taking active roles. After that we were split into two groups and went in to observe some cases. The interesting point about VCAT is that the cases are often less than an hour long, so we saw the results of some of the cases observed. After a well deserved lunch break, we proceeded to the civil court where the procedures are far more formal.

After an excellent explanation by a judge, we were allowed to observe a case for about an hour. County court cases are much longer than VCAT cases so we did not find the result of the assault charge. However, the students did get an interesting insight into some of the reactions of the jury. We had a pleasant ride back and returned to Kildare Campus late in the afternoon.

Parliament Alive



This week the Yr 11 Legal Studies class travelled to Inverloch to participate in the Regional Parliament Alive Program.

Our students learned about the history of our State Parliament, its formalities and traditions and the Law making process. Students were involved in a Mock Parliamentary reading of a proposed law.

The topic was the Sexting Bill. The bill's purpose is to regulate sexting and provide protection to both children and adults from exploitative sharing of intimate images, while ensuring that teenagers do not face unwarranted prosecution for child pornography offences.

It was a great opportunity to see how the Law making process works and the high level of debate that our Politicians are involved in when making amendments to our laws.

Students had scripted roles. It was a very interactive way of learning about how Parliament works and it really brought their textbooks to life.

Paralympian in our Midst!!



avalla Catholic College student Emily Beecroft is off to Rio after being selected to represent Australia with the Aussie Dolphins swim team to compete at the Paralympics in September.

Emily is ranked in the Top 5 in the world for 50 metre butterfly, 50 metre freestyle and 100 metre freestyle and is in the top 15 in all her other events

She made her international debut at the US Para Championships in Bismarck, North Dakota in December last year where she was officially classified S9, and swam second in the 50 metre butterfly, 50 metre and 100 metre freestyle events.

At the Australian Swimming Championships in Adelaide earlier this month, coached by Dean Cooch, Emily won gold in the 50 metre and 100 metre freestyle and 50 metre butterfly events. All three swims were personal bests, but the 31.93 second 50 metre butterfly swim also broke the national record set by Madeleine Scott back in 2009.

On April 14th, she was named part of the Australian swim team for the 2016 Summer Paralympics in Rio.

It has been a long road to where she has go to, and on behalf of the Lavalla Catholic College community, we wish Emily all the very best in her endeavours to do well and we will be supporting you with greater interest from September 7th- 16th.

Both teams contained very inexperienced lineups with five rookies included in each team but the depth of basketball talent within the Lavalla community was evident with the boys finishing 6th place overall out of 23 boys teams.

For the 12th time in 18 years, the girls were able to overcome some extreme hurdles and outlast nine opposing teams to climb to the summit of the girls division to reclaim the shield.



Lavalla Boys are Touch Football State Champs



avalla Catholic College produced its first State Champions team in the final week of term one when three U15 Touch Football teams travelled to Mentone to compete in the 2016 State Championships.

Lavalla had two U15 boys' teams compete with one each in the Championship Division and Plate Division while the girls' team competed in the Plate Division.

The Lavalla girls captured a pair of wins first up against Luther College, Croydon Red and Our Lady of Sion College, Box Hill 2. However, the

girls finished with a loss to Luther College, Croydon Blue and a draw against Our Lady of Sion, Box Hill 1 which left them short of qualifying for the final.

The Lavalla boys 'Plate' team secured a strong 6-0 win in the first up match but eventually they would record an identical record as the girls with 2 wins, 1 loss and 1 draw effectively positioning them just short of qualifying for finals.

However, the U15 boys Championship team played a sound style of game and team exceptionally well to walk away from the Championships without a loss. The boys overcome Brighton Grammar School, Luther College Box Hill, Chaffey Secondary College Mildura and McKinnon Secondary College to sweep all opposition away with a strong performance on the field.





The boys had to be at their best on two occasions against the strong Chaffey team and they certainly came to play by producing a 4-2 win in the preliminary games and re-producing that effort in the final with a 5-2 victory to secure the U15 State Championship title.
