Pastoral Letter on the Victorian Government Inquiry into the Handling of Child Abuse by Religious and other Non-Government Organisations

The Bishops of Victoria together with the Leaders of Catholic Religious Australia and Catholic Religious Victoria have issued a Pastoral letter about the Parliamentary Inquiry into the handling of child abuse by religious and other non-government organisations. In the letter the Church Leaders state that they respect the parliamentary process and will cooperate fully with the Inquiry. The letter includes a Prayer for Healing which can be used for individual or group prayer. Copies of the Pastoral Letter are available on our webpage and the extended article is also published in this edition.






# Kildare Update Marco DiCesare - Campus Director

This week parents have received letters regarding those students who have fallen below the 85% attendance required by the College. The notification has been made at this time, as it enables parents to monitor via the Family Connect Portal their child's attendance. The timing also means that students still have time to improve their attendance prior to the end of the semester.

The State Government runs an initiative known as "It's Not OK to Be Away". While this initiative may be aimed at Government Schools, it is just as relevant to Lavalla Catholic College.

"It's Not OK to Be Away is an initiative aimed at building a school and community approach to the issue of student attendance. The initiative is designed to change community and student attitudes to school attendance. It requires the support of both parents and the community if student attendance is to be successfully addressed.

It's Not OK to Be Away promotes two key messages:

- Student attendance is the responsibility of everyone in the community
- Effective Schools monitor, communicate and implement strategies to improve regular school attendance, as this is a prerequisite for improving educational outcomes.

#### Information for parents/guardians

What is my responsibility as a parent/caregiver?

Make sure your child:

- attends school on ALL school days
- is on time every day

#### Make sure you:

- provide the school with an explanation if your child is away
- contact the school if your child does not want to go to school
- arrange doctor and dentist appointments out of school hours
- arrange personal shopping trips with your son/daughter or birthday celebrations out of school hours
- do not allow your child to stay at home for minor reasons.

#### Is regular attendance at school important?

Yes - from the first day. If your child misses the basic skills in primary school they can experience difficulties with their learning. Regular attendance is essential to make sure learning is not disrupted. Regular learning provides building blocks for the future.

#### **Anti-bullving Reflection**

The below story was written by one of our talented Kildare students, Tess Jenkins, and was recently published in the Marist Advent Booklet that was sent worldwide electronically. It is a touching and personal account and we congratulate Tess on sharing her story.

Hi my name is Tessa, I am 17 and I live with my parents and my older brother in Moe Victoria, Australia. I go to a nearby Marist catholic school called Lavalla Catholic College in Traralgon, Victoria, Australia. I have cerebral palsy and epilepsy. When I came to this school I discovered one of my classes is down at the very back of the school and my locker and homeroom are at the front. I also found that the ladies toilets are upstairs. The reason why it's so hard for me to go to the toilets upstairs is because of my cerebral palsy. I find it hard because one side of my body is weaker than the other. My strong side is the only side I can really use so climbing stairs is really difficult. There is a lot more walking and that also goes for my classes all around the school. The toilet problem is fixed because I can use the year 12 toilets or the extra toilets around the school.

I find Maths hard because it is difficult to concentrate with the extra noises in the class. But I can go to 'The Hub' where I have teacher's aides who can help me with any subjects, homework or study.

Even though I get ignored sometimes and I barely have any friends at the school, I don't let that get me down. I like to be involved in anyway I can. I am in the Remar group at school, doing my Red Crossing. I do Riding for the Disabled every Tuesday. I also do singing lessons and swimming. At school, I am in the Liturgical choir singing with the sopranos. I mostly hang around with the music people because they are all my friends.

People sometimes put me down because they don't think I can do certain stuff. But I don't take any notice of them anymore. I spent my grade six year having to play with the prep kids because my peers would not accept me. As long as believe I can do it, that's the most important thing.

Because I know what it is like to be bullied I thought of an anti-bullying play and decided to perform it with some friends of mine from the music group and Remar. We performed for some junior classes and the play was a great hit.

At home I put myself down so much that I don't bother going outside because of how many sports and leisure activities I can't do. My normal day at home is Facebook and playing Sims 3 or watching TV.

At school, I am given a lot of opportunities by my teachers, aides and friends. I wouldn't swap any school for this school.

Below is the reflection given at the Kildare Campus during the liturgy to mark the Feast of Mary's Assumption into Heaven celebrated on August 15<sup>th</sup>.

# **Assumption Reflection**

I sat for a long time in my study wondering what I would say today about this special feast day of Mary, Our Good Mother.

I put on my favourite music ... the soundtrack from 'The Tree of Life' starring Brad Pitt and scored by Alexandre Desplat, the same composer who did the soundtrack for the Harry Potter movies.

I looked up into my bookshelf for inspiration, running my eyes over title after title hoping to remember something in one of them that would trigger a response in me that I could then relate to you.

I had another cup of coffee and jiggled the keyboard waiting for inspiration. What could I say to the young adults of Traralgon at this moment of celebration as the world says adieu to the glory of the Olympic dream?

Quietly a thought came to me ... what we celebrate here today is like the peak experience of the Olympic athletes. # **Pastoral Letter**

on the

Victorian Government Inquiry into the Handling of Child Abuse by Religious and other Non-Government Organisations

Tuesday 21 August 2012

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

Over the last thirty years our society has become increasingly aware of the extent of sexual abuse of children, and of its terrible consequences. We know that the impact of abuse on children and their families can be devastating and lasting. The January 2012 Report on Protecting Victoria's Vulnerable Children (the Cummins Report) indicates the extent to which the abuse and neglect of children is a significant community issue and concern.

The suffering and trauma endured by some children who have been in the Church's care, and the effect on their family members, is a matter of continuing shame and dismay to all Catholics.

Let us be very clear. The sexual abuse of a child was, is and always will be a crime, and is contrary to all we believe in.

We know that parents especially feel an intense betrayal of trust, that even one child could have been so grievously hurt by people whose call it is to serve others.

The Church has apologised for these failures. Today we renew this apology to victims and their families.

We are deeply sorry.

# A Prayer For Healing

God of endless love, ever caring, ever strong, always present, always just: You gave your only Son to save us by the blood of his cross.

Gentle Jesus, shepherd of peace, join to your own suffering the pain of all who have been hurt in body, mind, and spirit by those who betrayed the trust placed in them.

Hear our cries as we agonize over the harm done to our brothers and sisters. Breathe wisdom into our prayers, soothe restless hearts with hope, steady shaken spirits with faith: Show us the way to justice and wholeness, enlightened by truth and enfolded in your mercy.

Holy Spirit, comforter of hearts, heal your people's wounds and transform our brokenness.
Grant us courage and wisdom, humility and grace, so that we may act with justice and find peace in you.

We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

We promise you that we will act on our apology by continuing to take decisive action to protect our children and to respond when abuse has occurred. From the late 1980s the Church in Australia began developing procedures for responding to complaints of abuse, culminating in 1996 with the Melbourne Response and Towards Healing as formal protocols to deal with allegations of abuse. These processes continue to be refined, and have as a central element the encouragement of victims and their families to report criminal matters to the police.

In April the Victorian Government announced a Parliamentary Inquiry into the processes by which religious and other non-government organisations respond to the criminal abuse of children.

The Church respects the Parliamentary process and will co-operate fully with the Inquiry.

It will be a challenging and difficult period for victims and their families, for us as a Church, and for other religious and non-government organisations who work with children across our community. During the Inquiry you may hear disturbing reports of cases in our past when Church processes to prevent and respond to abuse failed the children in our care. We need to learn from these failures to continue to ensure we do everything in our power to protect children.

Much good work is being done across our Church – in our parishes, education, health and welfare agencies – and in the careful implementation of policies and practices to provide the best possible protection for children in our community.

In this 'Year of Grace' for the Church in Australia let us all use this opportunity to be renewed in our concern for the suffering of others.
