Faith and Ministry

Into the Wild, Into the Future

One of the most confronting books I have read was the true story of Christopher McCandless, whose mysterious life and death was captured by Jon Krakauer in his book 'Into the Wild'. Some may be familiar with the follow up movie directed by Sean Penn.

Coming from a privileged background, McCandless was just entering society, having graduated from Emory University, with more than \$25,000 in savings and a family that loved him. He abandoned the mainstream life, broke contact with all that he knew, gave away everything he owned, and disappeared in the Alaskan wilderness as a homeless man for two years. McCandless decided to live in the wild, without the advents of modern human society. Living in an abandoned bus in the midst of the wilderness with nothing more than some basic supplies, McCandless braved savage elements. The details of the last year of his life are only known as he kept a careful diary of his time, his thoughts, and his reasons for fleeing from society.

Ultimately, he made the decision to return to society, but he was forced to return to his bus by a swollen river. At this stage he was battling a debilitating illness. In his final days, McCandless is weakened by hunger and the cold. He eventually decides that nature is only a refuge for a short while, that true happiness can only be shared with others. Some years after his disappearance, moose hunters in the Alaskan wild found McCandless's body partially decomposed in his bus, his diaries and meager supplies still nearby.

If I had read this book as an idealistic young man, fresh out of school or university I imagine I would have had more sympathy for the existential dilemma at the core of McCandless' tragic withdrawal from society. As a teacher and also as a newly minted parent, I found his extreme reaction to life's questions both chilling and perplexing. His story gave me cause to reflect on the awesome responsibilities of parenting and teaching. It made me promise to hug my daughter every day of her life, even when she is old enough for it to be unbelievably embarrassing. It also made me very grateful to work at our College, a place where we have as a part of our charter the holistic development of the young people in our care. We have the gospels as a guide, we have the support of a parent community who entrust us as teachers with the responsibility of nurturing "Strong Minds and Compassionate Hearts" and we have the model of Marcellin Champagnat, who spoke of love as the first ingredient in education.

I don't see the face of Christopher McCandless in our graduating year twelve students whose graduation this evening marks the end of their time with us. Unlike him, they are ready to embrace and shape the world, each in their own way. Every graduating class develops its own special characteristics, a timbre of their own. We have been fortunate in the all encompassing care that our graduates have for each other, they are a tightly woven community who care for the college and their legacy.

The last day of official year twelve classes began early for members of our Senior Jazz Ensemble who gathered to rehearse well before school officially began. That morning, 2011 began for this group of students, new section leaders, new music and a new ensemble after we bade farewell to our year twelve members the week before. My enduring memory of this year will be that many year twelve students turned up to this rehearsal, on a morning when it was anything but convenient, to sit next to a new year nine student who had taken their position in the band, just to help them out and make them feel welcome.

Any child of the eighties like me will remember Michael J. Fox as Marty McFly, telling his future father 'if you put your mind to it, you can accomplish anything'. God bless and good luck year twelves.

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Curriculum Update

Rainforest Roaming, Fungi Finding and Mapping Mayhem for Year 7

Perfect weather was enjoyed by all groups who attended the recent Tarra Bulga Field Trips. Students were awestruck by the ascent from the valley floor to the devastated hills of Callignee and Balook then the descent into the cool, quiet of Tarra Valley and its remnant cool temperate rainforest. Parks Victoria ranger, Craig Campbell, spoke about the area and other groups of students worked through a series of science, geography, history and English activities.

Hitting the Campaign Trail - Year 9 Students Mimic Real Life

Just as Victorians prepare to go to the polls Year 9 students have been leaning about how political parties get into power. The electorate, in this case selected Year 7 classes, listened to speeches, were promised many things in exchange for their vote and finally cast their preferences in a democratically run election. Curriculum Development

The Year 7 Curriculum Writing Team, including Roma Valentine, Kaylene Mustoe, Jo Maree Sharman, Kim Widrich, Gloria Zahra, Adriana Bianconi and Albert Van Berkel, meets regularly to ensure that the adoption of the netbook as a tool for enhancing learning is effectively planned. The Australian Curriculum, much like VELS (Victorian Essential Learning Standards) states that ICT (Information Communication Technology) is one of the general capabilities which each area of the curriculum needs to entwine within the learning programme.

Farewell 2010, Welcome 2011

As students and staff conclude the 2010 academic year, preparations are already being made for 2011. Students from Year 9 onwards have begun preparatory work within their chosen VCE and VET pathways. On December 7th Year 7 and 8 students will take part in a range of transition activities while Year 7 students of 2011 have another opportunity to visit and experience life as a secondary student for a morning.

At this time of the year, as teachers are finalising student reports, we urge students to think now about how they intend to start 2011. Year 7 students have completed their first year of secondary education and have adapted well to different routines and structures. Three students were selected to lay a wreath at The Shrine of Remembrance and all other members of the class attended the ceremony as representatives of our school. All classes were given lunch breaks at outlets of their choice and then using Melbourne's public transport each group travelled to either the Aquarium or MCG before finally catching the train home.

We will be finishing the school year on a fun note, by holding the St Paul's annual dance off. This event will promote team spirit and encourage students to let loose and show off their dance skills. The dance off will be conducted on the last day of term (Tuesday, 7th December) during period 4.
