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# From the Principal

#### Dear parents, students and teachers

Dedicated and talented themselves, our teachers Mrs Prue Scholtes, Ms Adriana Bianconi and Mrs Monica Justin (and their support team) gave generously of their time to ensure that our students benefitted from such an experience. They worked as a team to set a high standard and to provide a rich and engaging learning environment for our students; challenged them beyond their comfort zones and encouraged each actor to do his or her best. These are the components of an excellent class and when it comes together with such energy and passion as *Fame Junior* did, it becomes etched in our memories as a good school experience.

As a College we spend time to focus on our founder St Marcellin Champagnat on 6<sup>th</sup> June not because it is the anniversary of his death, though that is important and not even to celebrate ourselves as a fine Marist school which is also essential. We come together to be inspired by a man whose dream to make *Jesus Known and Loved* to young people is alive in the hearts of thousands of people who call themselves Marists. Marcellin's story inspires us to reach out to people in need and to show them that God is an intricate part of our lives. When we read Marcellin's letters to his Brothers we begin to understand how this deep faith in God transformed itself into a deep faith for his Brothers and the children in his community. It is hard not to be caught by that spirit and dedicate ourselves to making a difference to the lives of our young people.

Teachers at Lavalla try to emanate Marcellin's love for children because they know that without love it becomes impossible to capture the hearts of our students and if our hearts don't connect then the teaching becomes less effective. We are open to Jesus' work and presence in our lives and try to see the face of Jesus in the simplest of places. In this way we recognise the good that people do.

Holy Spirit, Giver of all good gifts, enter into my mind and heart. Give me the gift of knowledge and the grace to use it wisely.

Help me in all my endeavours. Give me perseverance and fortitude. Help my memory, that I may remember what I learn and recall it when necessary.

On Champagnat day, through the Champagnat medals we recognise students and teachers who strive to uphold Marcellin's values. Teachers nominate students who demonstrate the following qualities:-

- Actions and attitudes, which illustrate strong minds and compassionate hearts.
- · Genuine, straightforward, say what they believe respectfully
- Simplicity well-grounded and humble
- Honesty and friendliness with students and staff
- · Doing good quietly
- Examples of making a difference for those around them
- Able to influence their fellow students for good

We are entering into our Champagnat celebrations next week. A number of visitors, including some Marist Brothers, will be joining us at the mass and other festivities. Our whole community has come to recognise the Champagnat medal as our most prestigious medal and students seem to wait in anticipation as the medal winners are announced. We welcome families to join us in prayerful community on Thursday 6 June at the Champagnat centre at 9.30am.

We are just past the half-way mark of the term and almost the mid-point of the year. It is important that students plan their study programme carefully ensuring that all assignments are completed well. It is also the time of year where fatigue starts to set in and students can begin to lose motivation or to make the wrong choices about their behaviour and their reaction to some situations that would not normally bother them. Being in the 'middle' is like being at the fork of the road. A time to make a choice between which way to continue the journey.

For our students it's a time to think about performing well in their exams and completing all work that's due. For the teachers it is a time of review and ensuring that students are meeting their academic targets and behaving well for the good of the community. At this time of year, teachers are also weary trying their utmost to engage and motivate students until the end and students themselves can feel unmotivated and aimless because being in the 'middle' can sometimes feel that the end is too far out of reach.

As Lona Fowler says, "we have begun many things... and see but few completed". So as we prepare to move on from the half-way mark, let's focus on the things we have begun and help provide direction and focus for our students. Our senior students can sometimes lose sight of the need to care for oneself, especially if they are becoming anxious about the exam period. As parents the best you can do is to be supportive, to listen and to help your student set small reachable goals because it gives them a sense of achievement and it encourages them to keep going; ample rest and recreational time is also important and of course eating a healthy diet will provide the necessary nourishment. The College offers many avenues of support should you need to discuss your child's progress beginning with your child's LA or homeroom teacher, the campus counsellors and our welfare and wellbeing teams.

Mr Todd Proud was awarded VCAL Teacher of the Year award (2012). This award has previously been won by Mr Brett Van Berkel in 2010.


