



## From the Principal

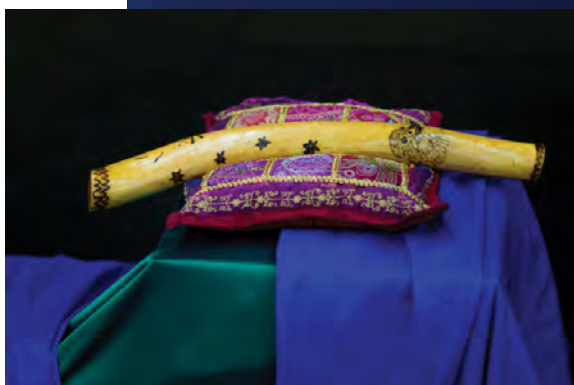

These students were a credit to our college and had amazing experiences focused around the whole concept of simplicity, that will resonate with them long after the classroom.

Therefore, it is clear that as a College we strive to achieve the concept of Simplicity by focusing on the quality of showing we believe what we say.

## Cause Worth Week

The week beginning the 16th of May we participated in our annual Cause Worth Week. Cause Worth Week is a week where we partake in a variety of fun events to fundraise and raise awareness for the Gippsland Cancer Care Centre.

Over our 14 years of Cause Worth Week we have raised a total of \$72,536. We have donated to the leukaemia foundation, the Rotary Centenary House and to the CFA, but for the past few years we have focused on an organization close to home, the Gippsland Cancer Care centre. With our fundraising efforts we to help ensure they have up to date technology to provide their patients with the best care possible. So far we have been able to buy over bed tables and blood pressure monitors for the hospital.

Our first event was the always competitive L.A Trivia which raised \$240, the winners being N4. We held a cake stall raising which raised \$246, a barbecue which raised \$139 and a college plain-clothes day raising \$2109.80.

Mersina Gelagotis, Taylah Da Ros and Sarah Becker cut their ponytails off and raised \$2905 to donate to the Princess Charlotte Alopecia Program which makes wigs for children who are suffering from alopecia. Congratulations girls.



Our biggest fundraising and most looked forward to event is the shave for a cure. Lachlan Day and Mitch Brown bared all and shaved their heads for a good cause. Lachlan raised \$1960 for the leukaemia foundation and \$850 for the Cancer Care Centre and Mitch raised \$787. All together we raised the most we have ever raised during the week, \$9253.

This is an amazing achievement and thank you to everyone for donating, participating, organizing and cooking. The biggest thank you to Ms Clarke who coordinated and organised the whole week.

This week also coincided with the Give a Damn Give a Can project which has provided students with the opportunity to support Rotary and Vinnies. Congratulations to Champagnat 6 once again reigning supreme in this LA competition with 207 cans collected and Nagle 2 not too far behind on 166 cans.

## Canberra Music Trip

This was the first time our College has performed at the National Eisteddfod of Australia. It was a great event, we heard school groups in both the Jazz and Concert Band sections the equal of anything I've ever come across before. The Eisteddfod has a slightly unique grading system (not uncommon in Eisteddfods now) that aims to recognise a 'level of achievement' with its placings and awards – this creates the reality where all or none of the performances can be deemed 'award worthy'.

Our Senior Concert Band performed in two sections – receiving an Honourable Mention in the Open section and a Silver Award in the U18B section.

Our Senior Jazz Ensemble also performed in two sections – receiving a 1st placing in the Open section and a Silver Award in the U18B section

Our choir had been generously granted an out of sessions performance. Our adjudicator kindly overruled our 'non-competitive' registration and awarded us a Gold level Award. He was particularly taken by both our performance of and the story of the genesis behind 'Gunnai Dreaming'. It was a very affirming experience for our students to be recognised at such an event in such a way.

Our students were fine ambassadors. Musically but also in the way they presented. We visited the Australian War Memorial where we sung our choral setting of 'In Flanders Fields', the National Gallery, Questacon and Parliament House. It is worth noting that our students were genuinely commended by the staff and guides we encountered at each of these places.

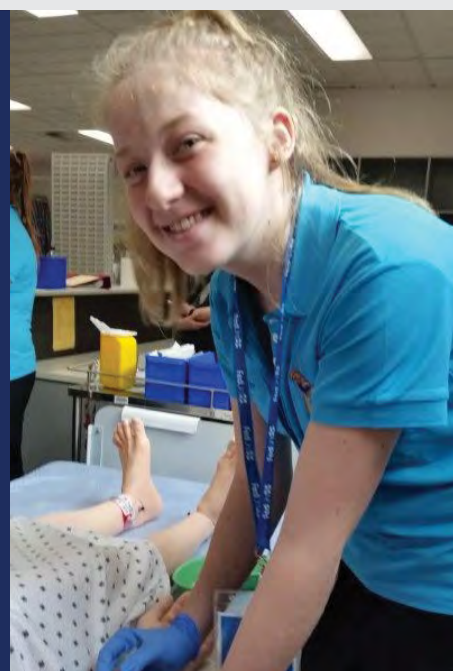
I found the excursion to Federation Uni to be a great experience.
