The analysis of the data and reflection on the engagement process with the community should position us to:


- Strengthen Catholic identity within the community;

Transition

As the Year 9 students moved to Kildare on Tuesday, Years 7 and 8 moved into the next year level. By running this three day transition program we have been able to sort through various issues with regard classes and subjects. The Year level learning leaders have spent considerable time constructing the classes for 2016. The major focus of these class groupings was to develop functioning, working classes. While for some students changes away from friends can present a challenge it is important to remember that this too is a learning opportunity. If your child is disappointed about the class change you might find the following from Michael Gross Parenting ideas helpful.

To help children handle disappointment try the following four strategies:

- 1. **Model optimism**. Watch how you present the world to children, as they will pick up your view.
- 2. Tell children **how you handle disappointment**. Not only is it reassuring for children to know that their parents understand how they feel but they can learn a great deal by how their parents handle situations.
- 3. Help children recognize times in the past when they bounced back from disappointment. Help them recognize those same strategies can be used again.
- 4. **Laugh together**. Humour is a great coping mechanism. It helps put disappointment in perspective. It helps them understand that things will get better. They always do.

The stronger the wind the stronger the trees is the notion here. Supporting kids to handle life's hurdles helps them to develop a lasting sense of resilience, which is essential for good mental and emotional health.


But that is not the whole picture. In our own families and circles, we know of numerous cases of quiet, unsung acts of generosity and care. The stories of Remar, Christmas hampers and Leadership Training are but a few current examples of the truth that humans have an immense capacity for giving.

The only solution to hatred is compassionate love. Babies and children bring this out best. And that is the value of Christmas. Matthew says, "the people living in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of the shadow of death a light has dawned (4:16)." There is always hope. There is always goodness. We need to pay attention to them.

The story of the first Christmas is an example. In those uncertain times a Roman emperor orders a census and King Herod

ruthlessly kills anyone, including children, who poses a threat. In those uncertain, very like ours, Mary and Joseph sought refuge, like so many people today, and Jesus was born in a stable in Bethlehem. Significantly, one of the infant's titles is "Prince of Peace".



The year 7 girls overcome some solid opposition in defeating Nagle College Bairnsdale and Mirboo North Secondary College while the


year 8 girl's won both encounters against Gippsland South Secondary College.

Ola Luczak - Nutritionist Visit

Ola Luczak who is a Sports Nutritionist affiliated with the Victorian Institute of Sports spoke to the students on Thursday 19th of November about healthy eating and the importance of hydration. Ola shared her knowledge with the Year 7 cohort in the morning and in the afternoon sessions shared her expertise with our Sports Enrichment students. She spoke about the importance of protein in repairing muscles and ensuring that an athlete distributes protein during the day to aid recovery and build muscle.

She assisted students in looking closely at their own diet/lunchbox and incorporating ways to improve the contents of them on a daily basis. She discussed the importance of hydration and gave examples of ways to build this into their everyday lifestyles. Students had the opportunity to discuss with Ola their own individual needs and she was able to offer advice share her knowledge.

Ola Luczak will be visiting the college again in 2016 to work closely with our students.

Revolution Spin in Traralgon will be opening their doors to our students on Thursday the 3rd of December to complete two training sessions, one hour on Strength and Conditioning and another hour on Recovery. Our students will be lead by Andrew Crozier who has many years experience in this area. He will also offer advice to our students on career pathways and obtaining opportunities to work in this field. His expertise will continue to be provided to our students in 2016.
