KILDARE CAMPUS

The Mid-Year Examinations and GAT All students studying Unit 3 subjects will be involved in either VCAA Exams or School Assessed Coursework (SAC) tasks during the week from *Monday, June 7 to Thursday, June 10*. Consequently all Year 12 (Unit 3) classes have been suspended for the week. Students were issued with their personal timetables and GAT pamphlet on Thursday, May 27 during the Mentoring Period. *All scheduled exams or assessments are compulsory*. Students will need to be at school *at least* 15 minutes before the exam or the assessment task is to commence.

Full school uniform is to be worn on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for presentation at the Exams; however, the uniform will not be required to be worn on Thursday for the English LOTE Oral SAC's. Friday is a pupil free day for Report Writing.

Year 12 Students, who do not have an exam on a particular day during the week, are not required at school. Years 10 and 11 students are required at school as usual. The VCE Study Centre will be open and available for Year 12 students throughout the week. Students will need to check with their teachers concerning their availability during this time.

General Achievement Test

All students doing any VCE Units 3 & 4 are required to sit the General Achievement Test (GAT), unless their school principal exempts them. The GAT is a test of general knowledge in the areas of written communication, mathematics, science and technology, and humanities, the arts and social sciences. It is an essential part of the VCE assessment procedures. Although the GAT result does not count directly towards a student's VCE results, it does play an important role in checking that the school assessments and exams have been accurately assessed.

It is important that students do as well as they can on the whole test to ensure that they receive full advantage of the Victorian Curriculum Assessment Authority's additional checks on VCE student assessment. The Authority uses GAT scores as a basis for reviewing school assessments in SAC's and SAT's, requesting authentication checks by schools for particular students' SAC's or SAT's, checking the accuracy of exam marking and contributing to the statistical moderation of SAC's.

The GAT will take place in a single threehour session. There will be two writing tasks, each of about half an hour, and a multiple-choice task that will take about two hours. Whilst the tasks may be completed in any order, it is suggested that the writing tasks be completed first, followed by the multiple-choice questions. Students can go back to any part of the test at any time, because the script books will not be collected until the end of the testing time. I would like to wish all students doing their mid-year exams every success.
