"Mary teaches us to say YES to God with generosity; to be pilgrims of faith and disciples of Jesus; to develop a listening attitude; to discern God's call by reflecting on events and keeping them in our hearts; and to rejoice at and give thanks for the marvels God works in us."

Dear Parents, students and staff

There is much to celebrate in the month of May. As many of you know May is the month of Mary and Mary is a very important person not only in the Catholic Church but also for all who belong to the Marist charism. As Jesus' mother she represents the gentleness of motherhood, courage, sacrifice and love. May, calls to mind our own mothers, as well as the joy of celebration that surrounds Catholic Education Week.

As you might remember last year I attended the Marist XX1 General Chapter to help discern, amongst other things, the future direction of Marist Education. The theme for the conference was, With Mary, go in haste to a new land. (Lk 1: 39). Together we dreamt a future that:

"... presumes a willingness to move on, to let go of the familiar, to embark on a journey of both institutional and personal transformation. As Marist, we travel this road with Mary, our guide and companion. Her faith and openness to God's will inspire us to undertake new challenges.

This "new land" is our authentic renewal; it asks of us a genuine change of heart".

The message of the Chapter, so eloquently captured by the then newly elected Superior General, Br Emili Turu, is especially relevant for us as teachers and most appropriate as we celebrate Catholic Education Week. I came home quite energized by the following Call:

To you who are working in our educational and social works, we invite you to encourage your students to transform their hearts, their lives and actions, so that they grow to be persons with respect for life, committed to the building of a just and solidarity-oriented society.

Teach the students the importance of ecology, and encourage them to be willing to work towards a better and sustainable world. Realize that the idea of going out to a new land carries some implications: sharing the responsibility for mission, giving priority to evangelization, giving preference to the poor and least favoured, and transmitting the Marist charism to a new generation of educators. In the next few days you will receive in the mail our Strategic Plan for 2010 and should find traces of this Call in our planning. You will notice our increased focus on Solidarity projects as well as an exploration of new ways of doing. It is in this context that we have decided to review our Year 8 camp experience to include a unique solidarity experience. In addition, our senior students have been challenged to work toward an immersion experience before the end of the year. Students will be challenged to **share the responsibility**, as much as they are able, working with the marginalised in our community.

Skills Acquisition Program

The VCAL students and staff have been involved in the Skills Acquisition Program that has run throughout term one. The program is geared towards getting students "work ready" through focusing upon the key employability skills of Communication, Team Work, Problem Solving, Technology, Initiative and Enterprise, Planning and Organisation, Self Management and Learning. This is achieved by students undertaking two week blocks of specific skills and classes aimed at enhancing their employability skills.

The classes undertaken were Group Development and Leadership conducted by *Mr Todd Proud*. This focused upon the skills needed to become an effective team member and leader within a workplace environment. Occupational Health and Safety conducted by *Mr Peter Flahavin* concentrated upon safety, specific to youth in the workplace and completion of 'work safe' certificates. Tool Safety with *Mr Jason Szkwarek* looked at correct use of basic hand tools in the workplace and creation of a free standing wine rack. Manual Handling conducted by *Mr Mark Warnock* focused upon injury prevention and correct lifting techniques with visits to industry locations to see firsthand types of procedures/ equipment in place. Workplace First Aid conducted by *Mr Brett Van Berkel* looked at skills such as CPR, Bleeding Control, Fractures and Poisons. Essential skills for work and life, Career Planning, Organisation, and Cold Calling were conducted by *Ms Cheryl Hunter*. Students have organised their work placement for May, updated resumes, application letters, practised cold calling for jobs, visited workplaces and have undertaken mock interviews.

All the VCAL students (Yr 11 & 12) were divided into five groups with a combination of year 10 (VALU). The VALU students have also been working hard to complete all the outcomes together with the VCAL students and this is pleasing to see. The groups have worked well in their teams to complete the activities that were rotated on a fortnightly basis. This teamwork was enhanced by the day at Coonawarra Adventure Park where all students completed a number of challenging activities with the focus upon group development.

The completion of the Skills Acquisition Program leads us into the Career Enterprise and Opportunity Program (CEO) that will take place for the rest of the year. Students have created micro business in which there are managers (Yr 12 students and some Yr 11) tradesmen/women (Yr 11) and apprentices (Yr 10 VALU). This is an exciting time as students are completing the planning and the 'action' phase will begin soon. Some examples of the business are "Stylish Hair and Beauty", "Right Wire" Electrical and S & S Engineering just to name a few. Watch this space for the developments in the CEO program for 2010.









Careers

Term 2 is a key time of the year for students in year 12. It is a time when they need to review their progress so far and make some decisions about what they might do next year. What plans do they need to have in place for next February when, for the first time in their memory, they will not be bundled off to school? They are starting to think seriously about their pathways from school to further education and training or employment. A number of the students attended the Age Careers Expo at the Caulfield racecourse. They now have more questions than answers and are being challenged to explore their options. There are a lot of materials coming from the Universities, TAFEs and other organisations to help with their research. These materials can be accessed in the Careers office at Kildare. All year 12 students who will be applying for an ATAR*, (formerly known as ENTER) will be attending a Tertiary Information Service session at Monash Gippsland on the 13th May. This session will help with their research.

*ATAR - Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank

This is the way Universities rank the students who have applied for their various courses. An ATAR above 80 means that the student's performance has been ranked in the top 20% of all students doing VCE this year, above 60 puts them in the top 40% etc. The greater the competition for places in a course, the higher the ATAR required. It is important to remember that the ATAR is not a measure of the student's life so far. The highest ATARs are achieved by the hardest workers. These are often the students who do not have the greatest natural talent for academic work.

YEAR 9 FOOD TECHNOLOGY LET'S CELEBRATE! – 9.01 & 9.02 with Mrs Sim

Our first term of work has almost been completed in our new Year 9 Food units. Students have been hard at work during the term completing the design process of Investigating, Designing, Producing and Evaluating. Our topic for the design brief in "Let's Celebrate!" was "Cupcakes". Students created their own design brief topic and then completed all phases of the technology process to produce their final product. Many lessons were spent researching and developing decoration skills and then finally the cupcakes were made and decorated. The results were amazing to say the least. Digital Revolution Update

Wireless on the College Campuses

Our cabling contractors have now completed all the infrastructure works to enable wireless delivery. We now have wireless coverage on all three campuses for laptop use. The cost of this was met with the funding from the Federal government to meet such costs as part of the Digital Revolution initiative.

Higher speed Internet

The College is part of Catholic Network Australia which has provided the College with a higher speed link to the Intranet. In addition to this the College is contributing towards the costs for a higher speed link between Newborough and Traralgon increasing the speed of Internet delivery for students based at the Presentation Campus. Communication and the transfer of files and data between the campuses is now much faster.

New Laptops

We have just taken delivery of 450 laptops funded by the Federal government to add to our current stock to provide enough computers for every Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 student. These laptops are being currently prepared with the

appropriate software and security by our hard working IT staff and will be rolled out shortly.

Professional Learning Clusters

As part of the computer roll-out all teachers in Professional Learning Clusters are training to equip themselves with computers skills. We have groups of staff who are training to

- use blogs to deliver curriculum resources and interact with students,
- create on-line course material for students to access from home.
- use digital story telling
- improve their skills with Word, Excel, Powerpoint, and other non-Microsoft software
- find good resources for classroom use

They were able to examine the pressures that our coasts are facing, while also finding time for surfing and kayaking. At the end of their week away,

students were able to take things into their own hands by formulating and presenting their own action plan for their school and community.

Coastal Ambassadors involves attending a six day camp at Phillip Island Nature Park exploring the complexity of our coastline, oceanography, marine biology, environmental management, habitat conservation, animal behaviour, impacts of pollution and interacting with scientists, rangers and other people working to protect and sustain our coasts. DARE THE DREAM What is your dream for your life?

Marcellin Champagnat, when he founded the Marist Brothers, had a number of dreams for life. One was to "make Jesus Christ known and loved"; another was to educate young people to be "good citizens and good Christians". These dreams grew out of his own experience – he had 1 day of formal schooling by age 14, a bad moment with a cruel teacher. Not long after ordination he attended a dying 16-year-old-boy who knew nothing about God. This moment had a profound impact on Champagnat and he resolved to begin an Order of Teaching Brothers. His first two recruits were almost illiterate too.

So, imagine the risk, the audacity, the faith needed to make the venture work. Bringing dreams to reality requires such audacity and huge determination and sacrifice. Michelle Timms, captain of the Australian Women's basketball team that won silver at the Sydney Olympics, spoke at the recent AMSA Basketball Dinner of the huge sacrifices she had to make, especially to her social life, to achieve her dream. Such determination and sacrifice has set her up for life now.

Marcellin's dream, lived mostly in rural France after the French Revolution, within a 50-mile radius of where he grew up has blossomed into a large venture in 77 countries around the world. Another of his dreams was to have "the whole world Marist". He had to face down plenty of opposition from fellow-Priests and government inaction. For him, trust in God and Mary enabled him to remain hope-filled.

Now – what about your dreams for your life? For living your passion? What will you do for that? Be bold and audacious, a risk-taker.
