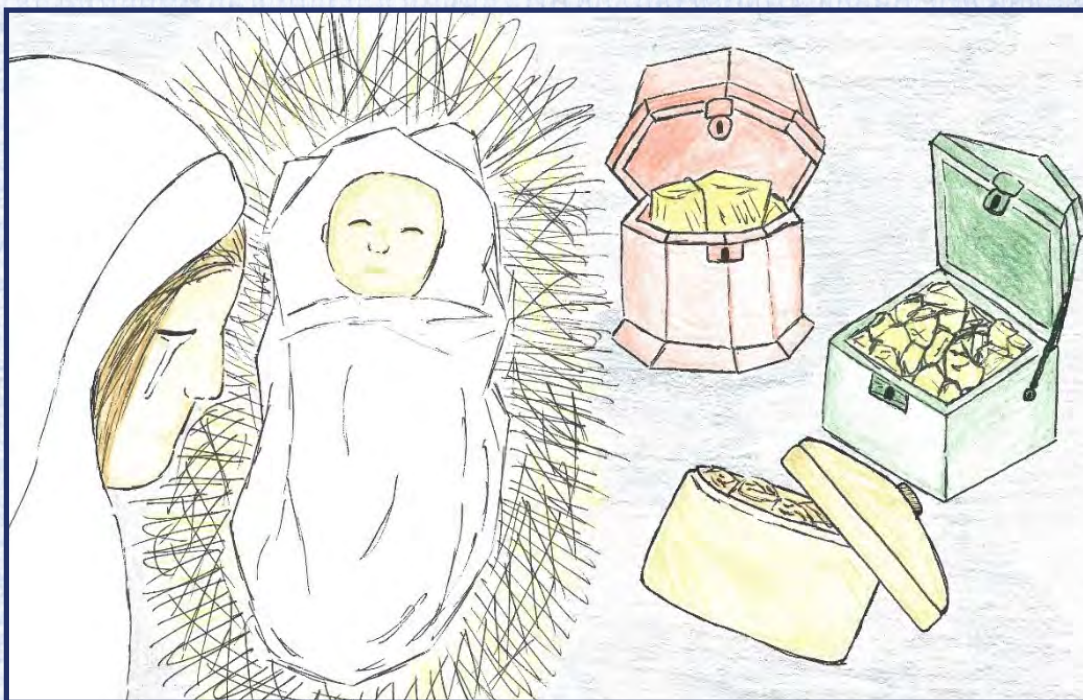

Christmas 2017

The focus of Christmas, and rightly so, is the baby at the centre of the family. The birth of every child is a time for family celebration. It is a universal event. The picture invites us to discern in each birth the elements of Jesus' birth, and give glory to God for this miracle of a child who has been given to parents, a child that will mysteriously grow to bring hope and affirm the wonder of humanity.

But Christmas is a life-giving event and does not stop with birth; it is an ongoing story of growth and giving, as these stories from India attest.

Since arriving to India in 1974, the Marist Brothers have developed several schools and projects to help "untouchable" children break the cycle of poverty. They run three schools in the country, located in the Tamil Nadu state in the south India.



Marist Primary School at P. Udayapatti has two Brothers and five lay teachers educating 300 children. The majority of the students are Hindus, while the minority are Muslim and Christian.

Marist Higher Secondary School at P. Udayapatti has three Brothers and 35 lay teachers educating 900 children. It provides secondary education for boys and girls from different villages.

The Vizhalanmedu Nursery and Primary School has two Brothers educate 150 poor rural children. The school was established in 2015 after a strong support of donors and St Patrick's College in Dundas, Australia.

Since 2003, the non-profit Marcellin Trust for social and humanitarian work in the country has developed two Operation Rainbow and La Valla Evening Study Centres. Operation Rainbow provides care and support for children affected by HIV/AIDS, as well as several other projects to provide skills for parents affected by HIV/AIDS such as, basic computer education for children and aid for people affected by the 2004 earthquake and tsunami. La Valla Evening Study Centres, that helps 380 children in after school work in 12 locations in the districts of Karur and Tiruchirappalli. Fourteen teachers and three Brothers work there.

So bring on the decorations, the turkey, the gifts and the laughter, joy and peace. But also do something to bring growth around you.

45th Marist Cricket Carnival, Traralgon

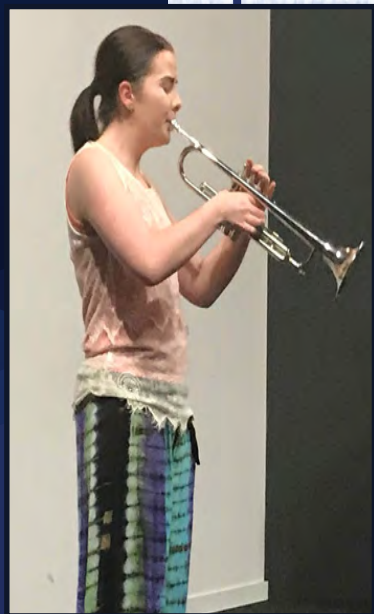

Systems Engineering

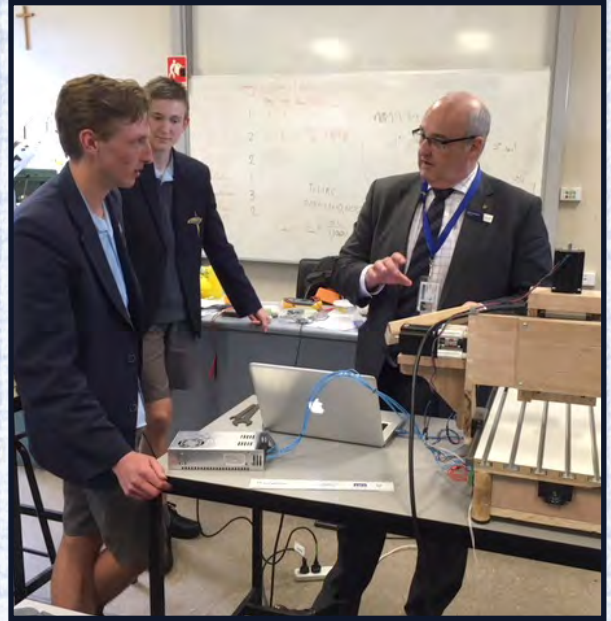

Earlier in November, Mr Freeman inspected some outstanding work by the Unit 3 / 4 Systems Engineering students.

Again, the standard of product and folios was generally very high, coming after last year when Lachlan Marshall's work was displayed at Top Design at Melbourne Museum. He made a hovercraft from scratch and his accompanying folio was of such a standard that it achieved a perfect score of 80 points. This was the first time that such a score had been achieved in this subject in the last 10 years.



It was extremely gratifying to see that Justin Hough was able to attain the same standard this year. Justin constructed a Computer Networked Milling Machine (CNC cutter) that was able to mill out objects in wood or plastic to an accuracy of 0.01 mm. Justin's folio and product was also worthy of

being displayed at Top Designs, but at the time of writing, he has not received confirmation of this.

Mr Freeman spoke to the students at length about their projects and expressed his admiration for the way they managed their projects and the depth of technicality that each student attained.

The 2017 Lavalla Reading Project

This year a small group of teachers undertook a Community of Practice Project supported by VATE (Victorian Association of the Teaching of English). Lisa Templeton, Pam Goodall, Kelly Murray, Emma Winton and Kim Widrich attended training and were supported by a VATE representative as they trialled a range of reading strategies within their classes.

This group would like to thank members of the school community who supported this project: parents who provided permission for their student to participate, students who shared their experiences and provided feedback as well as teachers who were open to trialling these strategies in their classrooms. The goal of this group was to investigate how students read and develop strategies for helping students relate to texts.



The work of this project does not end this year. The application of these reading strategies will be trialled within a range of subject areas in the future in order to help students become proficient, confident readers. This project culminated in a presentation at the recent VATE Conference.



Reading Project Team Present at State Conference

After some nervous anticipation and dodging the torrential downpour on Friday the first of December, Ms Kim Widrich, Ms Lisa Templeton and I arrived at the Victorian Association for the Teaching of English's state conference at Deakin University. The conference was an exciting opportunity for the three of us, on behalf of our co-members Ms Pam Goodall and Ms Kelly Murray, to present the literacy 'Community of Practice' project on reading.

The workshop involved teachers from all over the state, who provided their own thoughtful musings on the practice of building student engagement of reading. A series of activities, delivered to our own students, formed the basis for the workshop. Teachers spent time drawing themselves as readers as well as participating in a dramatic freeze frame, where they engaged their inner voices to consider the feelings and perspectives of each character. It was a delightful and exhilarating experience to share our findings and discuss the impact with a group of like-minded colleagues.

The opportunity to share our findings and ideas at the state conference was a very special one for all members of our project. We thank our VATE critical friend, Mary Mason, for working with us throughout the year, VATE for supporting teachers in developing their professional practice in new and exciting ways as well as our own College leadership who were able to see the value in this activity and supported our work.



Premier's Spirit of ANZAC

Prize winners will be announced by the Premier of Victoria in the new year.
