General College Information

Free Meningococcal ACWY Vaccine for Years 10, 11 and 12

In 2017 the Victorian Secondary School Vaccine Program will offer free meningococcal ACWY vaccine to students in Years 10, 11 and 12. The vaccine provides protection against four strains of meningococcal disease (ACWY) and is administered as a single dose.

Parents/guardians of Year 10, 11 and 12 students should look out for the Meningococcal ACWY Secondary School Vaccine Program consent card coming home from school with your child. You need to read the information, complete and return the card regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.

Adolescents are at increased risk of meningococcal disease. Although uncommon, it can become life-threatening, very quickly. There are different strains of meningococcal bacteria known by letters of the alphabet, including meningococcal A, B, C, W and Y. In recent years, the meningococcal W strain has increased across Australia, with Victoria experiencing 11 cases to date in 2017 and 48 cases in 2016, compared to 17 cases in 2015, four in 2014 and one in 2013. It is now the predominant strain in Victoria.

The Latrobe City Council immunisation service may contact you about the meningococcal ACWY vaccine program. Schools are authorised to provide basic parent/guardian contact details to local councils for this purpose. Contact the school by 9 June 2017 if you do not want your contact details given to the Latrobe City Council immunisation service.

Preparing for GATs

f your son or daughter is completing a Unit 3 & 4 VCE or VCE/VET subject in 2017 they will need to complete the VCAA General Achievement Test on Wednesday 14 June at 10am.

This will be completed in the Kildare Hall or the Kildare Information Services Centre. We have provided a number of sessions for the students briefing them on the procedural process for the day and how to achieve their best on the GAT. Past GAT papers have been provided to students as well hints on how to study for it. All students have been encouraged to strive to do their very best on the GAT and to take time to prepare for it and familiarise themselves with the past papers provided.

What is the General Achievement Test (GAT)?

The General Achievement Test is a test of general knowledge and skills in:

- written communication
- mathematics, science and technology
- humanities, the arts and social sciences.

These areas are very broad.

Each represents a body of general knowledge and skills that students are likely to have built up through their school years.

Students can get a good idea of the questions by looking at previous GAT papers. Students are encouraged to familiarise themselves with these questions and note that all the information needed to work out the right answer is provided.

Why do students have to do the GAT?

The GAT is an essential part of the VCE assessment procedures.

All students enrolled in one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3 and 4 sequences must sit the GAT.

Although GAT results do not count directly towards a student's VCE results, they play an important role in checking that school-based and external assessments have been accurately assessed, and in calculating Derived Examination Scores.

The GAT is used in these ways because achievement on the GAT is a good predictor of achievement on other assessments. If students have done well on the GAT, then their achievements are likely to be high on their school-based and external assessments.

Clearly, some GAT questions relate more closely to achievement in particular studies. The VCAA takes this into account when it calculates students' expected achievements in each study for each school. For example, GAT results in mathematics, science and technology play only a minor part in calculating students' expected achievements in humanities studies.

Preparing for GATs

How is the GAT used?

The VCAA will use students' GAT scores as a basis for:

- contributing to statistical moderation of school-based assessment results
- checking the accuracy of external assessment marking
- calculating the Derived Examination Scores.

Permitted materials

An English and/or bilingual printed dictionary may be taken into the GAT; however, a thesaurus or a combined thesaurus-dictionary is not permitted. Electronic dictionaries and calculators are not allowed. Pens, pencils and an eraser to complete answers to the GAT will be required. Students must use a blue or black pen for the two Writing Tasks and a pencil for their responses on the Multiple-Choice Answer Sheet.

Time and tasks

The GAT will take place in a single three-hour session. There will be two writing tasks and 70 multiple-choice questions.

While students may complete the tasks in any order it is suggested they complete the writing tasks first, then the multiple-choice questions. Bear in mind that any part of the test may be revisited at any time because the answers won't be collected until the end.

It is suggested that students divide the three hours into the following approximate time allocations.

Writing task 1 30) minutes

- Multiple-choice questions 2 hours

Tips on doing the GAT

- Read all the information carefully.
- Read each question carefully and try to pick out the key ideas and information.
- For the multiple-choice questions, try to quickly reject choices that appear wrong, then read the question again and select the answer most likely to be right.
- Attempt all questions and don't spend too much time on any one question. Questions can also be revisited later.

The annual VCAL Group Development Day was a resounding success and an opportunity to bring students together to experience a range of challenging

activities and cement the learning that had taken place over the last term.

Each staff team member brings something special to the program and was responsible for designing a challenge station. Whilst the theme was similar to last year, the activities were more diverse calling on range of skills and abilities and value adding to the program.

Activities included:

- Sensory Challenge
- Rescue Raft
- Geocache
- Kahoot Quiz
- Flat pack Challenge

Sessions challenged the senses, memory recall, technology skills, navigation skills, cryptic clues, problem solving, general knowledge and readiness for work, construction and problem solving. These tools are all underpinned by the intention of establishing collaboration through group development.

The vertical structure of VCAL (YR 10-12) allows all students to shine and once again we witnessed outstanding leadership by the Senior students, who motivated their team members to bring out their best.

Upon reflection students commented on the fun they had on the day and were encouraged to nominate their best team members. It is always great to see future leaders in action in the program and we witnessed a number of YR 10 students on the day who definitely have these traits. Patrick Ryan took out the peer award for most outstanding student on the day while team "Neil Flanagan" took out the group award.



Maton Guitars Factory Tour

Students in VCE Product Design Units $\frac{3}{4}$ are required to explain the factors that influence the design, development and manufacture of products within an industrial/commercial setting.

Each year we try to visit a different manufacturer from the year before. This brings new understandings for the teacher and provides an opportunity to use past visits as case studies in class.



This year we chose Maton Guitars as our destination. Maton is an Australian manufacturer of guitars and other fretted musical instruments. Maton was founded in 1946 as the Maton Musical Instruments Company by Bill May and his brother Reg. Reg was a wood machinist, and Bill a jazz musician, woodwork teacher and luthier who had for some years operated a custom guitar building and repair business under the name Maton Stringed Instruments and Repairs. The name "Maton" came from the words "May Tone" and is pronounced May Tonne.

We observed the large billets of Otway Ranges grown Australian Blackwood being taken from the kiln to be broken down via a band saw to create book matched pieces for the fronts and backs of the guitars.

It was great to observe the luthiers (guitar makers) use hand tools and skilled craftsmanship to work on the guitars from that point on. Quality control was exceptional with every process heavily scrutinised to ensure the highest quality.

We were fortunate enough to catch an ex- student who was in her 2nd year as an apprentice and loved working there. She secured this apprenticeship whilst on Structured Workplace Learning through the VCAL program. Students observed steam bending, spray painting, intricate inlay work and the tuning of the final product by some highly skilled craftspeople.

Needless to say, most, if not all employees are pretty handy with the guitar.

The first hand experience of a factory tour proves to be an invaluable one, giving students the opportunity to contextualise what was learnt over the weeks leading up to the visit.


