Thank you to Year 11 Youth Ministry Class who organised the Annual Winter Sleepout and all students and staff who participated. The focus of this event is to deepen the students understanding of the meaning of homelessness, the extent to which it occurs in all parts of Australia and to also prepare hygiene packs to distributed to those in need.

### Child Protection

National Child Protection Week which is coordinated by NAPCAN started on Father's Day and will end tomorrow. The aim of the week is to engage members of the community in supporting families and protecting children. In 2019 National Child Protection Week focus was on introducing a 'child development' communication frame to promote the messages that: Kids do well when parents are supported; and to raise thriving kids, parents need support to navigate life's choppy waters.

This theme is based on evidence from the Frameworks Institute research commissioned by the Parenting Research Centre, which shows us the most effective way to talk about parenting and child wellbeing is with a 'child development' frame that: Focuses on children and what they need to thrive, rather than blaming or evaluating parenting; Establishes the importance of interaction with parents and caregivers to child development, rather than assuming that young children simply grow; Helps people see that circumstances shape options, rather than assuming that good parenting comes naturally to individuals; and Uses a 'navigating waters' metaphor where boats represent families/parenting, weather/hazards represents the circumstances that can affect us all, and lighthouses and safe harbours represent the support that we all need.

Changing the way we communicate and engage with families can take time and consideration.

This is a whole new way of 'framing' the conversation about child wellbeing and parenting, which will require a long term commitment.

## The Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Trail

On the 26th of August the Italian students went to see the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Trail. We learned about the Aboriginal culture and the origin of the GunaiKurnai people who were divided into five clans. This story explained how the clans were formed.

A long time ago, the first people were animals and there was a pelican who came from the mountains in the North West carrying a canoe on his head. While he was walking, he heard tapping and found out there was a duck called Tuk. They married and they started the GunaiKurnai people. Then there were other panels about Aboriginal daily life. One was about traditional tools like fishing nets to catch fish, eel trap and baskets for storage and transport made from plants. Another was about meeting places for men, women and elders. They were represented in shapes. Men were represented as diamonds and women as circles while the elders were in the middle. The next panel was about shields. They were used to carry food and water and in war against tribal groups. There was one shield for every clan. The last panel was about a snake moving around water areas and dry areas. This snake brings rain that follows it. That's what we learned about the Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Trail.

## St. Teresa of Kolkatta

Mother Teresa is easily the most recognisable woman of the Twentieth Century! When she died on 5th September, 1997, the world media paid glowing tributes to this extraordinary life. Meanwhile, India, mourned; "we have lost our amma (mother)", they said, and millions filed in silence past her body before the funeral. Paradoxically, she is not Indian. She was born in Albania, a Catholic nun in an Irish order, working in a non-Christian country. She was poor, without wealth, power or status. Yet, because of her complete commitment to the poorest of the poor across the globe, she became the face of human dignity and compassion. Such was her universal appeal and power that India gave her a state funeral, normally reserved only for Prime Ministers, presidents and such persons, that Heads of State and other dignitaries attended. Pope Francis canonised her on September 4, 2016 and today she is known as St Teresa of Kolkatta. Her Missionaries of Charity continue her work. One of her sisters came from Traralgon.

#### Who was this woman?

Her story is quite extraordinary and worth reading for yourself. Father Julien Henry, her spiritual guide when she commenced her great work commented, "What is extraordinary is the amount of good Almighty God has worked through this humble instrument. God has used her qualities and defects... to do His work because she is completely subservient (obedient) to Him" (as quoted in "We do it for Jesus" by E. Le Joly, 1977 p. 14). Her advice in the picture above provides a clue to her the source of her motivation, method an dpower. We would do well to follow her advice in our daily lives.
