Congratulations to **Guguei Malual** who, last weekend, was awarded with a community award by The Latrobe Valley Soccer League (LVSL) for his contribution to the Barefoot to Boots Program. Guguei is commended for the implementation of this fund raising activity completed via his VCAL Community Awareness project. Guguei has a passion for this cause and genuine concern for others who have experienced a life similar to his story. Through this enthusiasm he collected more than 500 soccer boots, 300 strips, 20 soccer balls, 50 socks and 20 shin guards. In this newsletter is Guguei's story, written from his perspective.



### BAREFOOT TO BOOTS

My name is Guguei Malual and I was born in the Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya. I moved to Australia when I was 4 years old, with my parents and two sisters and I still remember the living conditions in the camp to this day. Being born there, I didn't know what I was missing until I moved to Australia and saw exactly how much I didn't have. Many people in Australia have so many things, that they go unused. Things that could really benefit the less fortunate in refugee camps. With this in mind, I decided to find a way to help the many children still living in Kakuma refugee camp for my Victorian Certificate of Applied Leaning (VCAL) community link project. I was fortunate to be able to partner with the Barefoot to Boots organisation. This organisation was founded by brothers Awer Mabil and Awer Bol, both like me, were born in the Kakuma refugee camp. The brothers started this organisation as they were looking to make a change to the conditions in the camp.

As I started to look into the various issues surrounding this project, I realised the main issue for me was the different groups of people that have been forced to flee their homelands because of war and then face extremely poor living conditions in refugee camps in Kakuma Kenya. All the refugees that made it to Kakuma refugee camp were all running away from their countries, including both my parents. They couldn't live in the war torn South Sudan, so fleeing to Kenya was the only option.

Thousands of refugees living in Kakuma are so poor that finding clothing, let alone shoes is a massive struggle. But they mask their struggle by indulging in activities, with the main one being soccer. You could play soccer all day and forget about everything that is happening around you. You could be the poorest person in the world, but when you are having fun and playing soccer you can feel rich in heart and mind. This is the impact that sport really has on people and more for those that sport is all they have. So by simply giving the right equipment to be able to enjoy the game even more, can be the smallest thing to ask, but the biggest gift to someone else. Most people that play soccer or footy have soccer boots laying around that are no longer in use for various reasons, though mostly because they may be too small. But those shoes that are laying around could go to a little kid in Kakuma refugee camp and put the biggest smile on their face.

This is what I set out to achieve and succeed at doing, with help from Tony Colman and Latrobe Valley Soccer League (LVSL). Tony Coltman got all the soccer clubs in the LVSL involved in the foundation and all, were more than happy to get involved and donate not only soccer boots but strips, soccer balls, socks, shin pads and other equipment. Others in the community also helped by donating what they no longer needed, but would benefit others. My original goal was to provide around 200 soccer boots and a few socks and soccer balls. In the end my team and I ended up collecting more than 500 soccer boots, 300 strips, 20 soccer balls, 50 socks and 20 shin guards. All of the gear we collected for donation was astonishing, and will really put the biggest smile on the many kids and adults in the Kakuma refugee camp that love the game of soccer.

I would like to say the biggest thank you to all those that donated and another to Tony Coltman, all of LVSL and Barefoot to Boots organisation for their immense support.



### SPEECH TO GRADUATING YEAR 12<sup>s</sup>

The following is an edited version of my speech to our Year 12 Graduands and their families at the Valedictory Mass.

So tonight we celebrate and give thanks that our Year 12 Graduands are prepared through the education received from home and at school to be ready to go forward, to be the best they can be and attain true happiness in life. We are also celebrating as we gather as a faith community at this Eucharist, in this Church, knowing that God is with them now and will continue to be with them to love and nourish these fine young people as they navigate the challenges of their various journeys.

Whilst, tonight is an important moment for all the young women and men we are here to celebrate graduating from Lavalla Catholic College, it is also significant for their families, particularly the parents. You, the parents and families, have nurtured and supported your sons and daughters, given them given them love, support and encouragement to become what they are capable of being. I know that they are grateful for this and we the staff of Lavalla Catholic College are thankful that you have allowed us to be part of their lives and to support you in the process of setting them on their way to reach great heights.

For the students, this is a time to celebrate. You are a success! To start a journey 13 years ago and finish it is a magnificent accomplishment in itself. We are proud of you and I hope you are proud of yourself.

I hope you may remember when I first spoke to all of you at the 2014 Commissioning Mass and it is has been a constant theme since then is that I want for all of you to be a person who had the capacity and the opportunity to make choices for themselves. I hope that you have aspired to this and I hope that we as a community have supported you to achieve that goal.

A goal to make informed choices about the type of future you want for yourselves. We want you to make choices that took into account not only your talents and desires, but also are respectful of the needs of others. Essentially, our wish, is reflected in our College Motto, we want you to be people with Strong Minds and Compassionate Hearts.

A key hope of St Marcellin Champagnat, the founder of the Marist Brothers, was that schools in the Marist tradition produced good Christians and good citizens. I think you will be a great example of that hope.

However, to achieve this goal, I believe there are a few really important things to remember and strive to achieve. The first piece of advice I about to provide I have being saying to students, including my own children, for almost thirty years, and that is to believe in yourself. If you don't it makes it hard for others to believe in you. Success is more about attitude than ability. Descartes, a French Philosopher wrote, "I think therefore I am!" In my experience, this is true, if you think that you are no good and no one will like me then that is how you will act and that is how you will be. However, if you think you can succeed, be a person who can make a difference, a person who can love and be loved, then you will act that way, see the world that way, will be that WAY!

You may have heard the cliché – today is the first day of the rest of your life – and one of the realities of clichés is that they are based in truth. Another truth is encapsulated by the words of US statesman and Secretary of State, Dean Acheson – "the best thing about the future is that it only comes one day at a time." Therefore, living in the present is essential to develop a quality of soul in our lives and in the lives of those for whom we care. This is not suggesting that you do not concern yourself with things of the future and only live for now. I am hoping that you will live your life being present in the present, being aware and reflective about what is happening inside and outside of you and how much influence you have. Don't just allow life to simply wash over you like some huge wave.

Eckhart Tolle captures these sentiments thus:

"Time isn't precious at all, because it is an illusion. What you perceive as precious is not time but the one point that is out of time: the Now. That is precious indeed. The more you are focused on time—past and future—the more you miss the Now, the most precious thing there is. Why is it the most precious thing? Firstly, because it is the only thing. It's all there is. The eternal present is the space within which your whole life unfolds, the one factor that remains constant. Life is now. There was never a time in your life was not now, nor will there ever be. Secondly, the Now is the only point that take you beyond the limited confines of the mind. It is your only point of access into the timeless and formless realm of Being."

Know that every moment counts and how you use it will influence all your nows – now and the futures nows.

- \* So what should you do with your nows:
- *Rest* it is the foundation of health and wisdom
- *Think* it is the source of achievement
- $\mathcal{R}_{ead}$  it is the foundation to wisdom
- *Play* it is the secret to staying young
- *Be quiet* it is the opportunity to seek God
- Share it is too short a life to be selfish

- $\mathcal{B}e$  aware it is the opportunity to help others
- Laugh it's music of the heart
- Be loved it nourishes the soul
- Be friendly it is the road to happiness
- Pray it's the greatest power on earth
- Dream it's the well of inspiration

Please know we believe you have the capacity, each in your own way, to make a contribution to life; not just in a functional way by pursuing a career and doing a particular job, but by being good women and men who loves others and can be loved by others; people who serve others, simply because it is the right thing to do; and be Good Christians and Good Citizens who are sensitive and responsive to the needs of those around you and to this Earth we call home.

Tonight we say to each of you young people in front of me – thanks for being part of our lives and of our community, we've valued your presence and contribution, we're glad to see you become the fantastic people you are and we wish you every success and blessing as you continue with the rest of your life. We hope that you take fond memories from your time with us here at Lavalla Catholic College and that you'll continue to be sustained by your friendships with and support of each other.

Ladies and Gentlemen of the Lavalla Catholic College Year 12 Class of 2019: know that love and peace in your life that comes from being nurtured and loved by God; may you have much happiness and joy in your lives; be successful; and be a source of uplift and encouragement, strength and support, generosity and hope to others. ### Reflection: True Self and False Self

Today's reflection is selected and adapted from Richard Rohr's message on 24 October, 2019

God transcends creeds and denominations, time and place, nations and ethnicities, and all the boundaries we humans create. We are not defined by gender, nationality, ethnicity, skin colour, or social class. These are not the qualities of our True Self in God! These are but social identifiers and they do influence our lives; but these should only serve to see each other as unique, and then see ourselves together. Often, we mistakenly allow temporary costumes, of the "false self," to pass for the true self, which is always "hidden with Christ in God" (Colossians 3:3)?

You are a child of God, and always will be, even when you don't believe it. And so is everyone else! God created us all. We are all God's children. God desires for us to live into the fullness of our humanity and our identity. If we stay small and "hide our light" under a bushel basket, there is almost no place for God to move in, through, and with us for the sake of the world! All learnng leads finally to this point: Know who you are. Be who you are. Be the person God created you to be. Amen.

### All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day, All Soul's Day

Halloween (an ellipsis of 'Hallows Eve'), arouses images of party costumes of witches, wizards and skeletons etc. with a custom of 'begging' for sweets ('trick or treat?). ## GEOGRAPHY NEWS

At the start of term 4, the Year 11 Geography class spent 3 days participating in a field trip experience in western Victoria as part of their tourism unit.

Accompanied by Mrs McAllister, we spent the first day travelling via

Geelong and Colac, visiting the dormant volcanic region of Red Rocks then onto our first overnight stop at Port Campbell on the Great Ocean Road.

Our second day involved students collecting primary data associated with the socio-economic and environmental impacts which tourism has on the Port Campbell National Parks region. To do this, students immersed themselves in observational tasks, taking photographs, conducting interviews and distributing surveys as well as having the opportunity to listen to Mr Mark Cuthell from the Port Campbell Visitor Information Centre. As part of the experience we visited a range of spectacular coastal landforms through-out the trip including Loch Ard Gorge, the Grotto, London Bridge as well as the 12 Apostles. Later that afternoon, we drove to Queenscliff for our 2nd overnight stay of the field trip. The evening entertainment centred around a 'Master Chef' style competition in which cabin groups planned and present a 3 course menu to the staff.

On the final morning, a small group of students were engaged in primary data collection throughout the township as well as being privileged to 2 wonderfully engaging talks presented by Brian from the Queenscliff Visitor Information Centre and Monique from 'Sea all dolphins swim'. Our return to Gippsland was capped off with a trip across Port Phillip Bay on the ferry and a relaxing drive back home.

Congratulations to all the students on the manner in which you prepared for and conducted yourselves on the trip. I have no doubt the skills and knowledge gained will not only result in some excellent field reports but also provide a strong foundation for the Year 12 Geography unit.

### **CFA Urges fire safety this Cup Weekend**

With much of East Gippsland experiencing drought condition in the lead up to summer, Trevor Owen, Assistant Chief Officer, CFA South East Region urges Gippslanders and travellers to keep safe this coming long weekend.

"Melbourne Cup is a great time for Victorians to travel and spend time with friends and family. I'd urge everybody this long weekend to pay particular attention to the safety of their BBQ, gas and campfires." Mr Owen said

If it's been awhile since you used your BBQ, there are three things CFA would really like you to consider.

- 1. Check to see if the cylinder is damaged. Don't try to refill a damaged cylinder exchange it a reputable supplier.
- Check the hose to make sure it hasn't deteriorated. Spray the hose and regulator connections with soapy water – if soap bubbles appear, you'll know that gas is escaping. This means you'll need to either correct the connections or replace your hose.
- 3. Check that your barbecue is clean. Excess fat or residue can cause a fire.

"Make sure you keep plenty of clear space between your barbecue and anything flammable. Be aware that if wind blows the flame out, unburnt gas can build up to dangerous levels. If this happens, turn off the gas at the cylinder, and wait a few minutes before you light the barbecue again."

For those travelling throughout Gippsland on Melbourne Cup weekend, Fire Restrictions will be in place in East Gippsland and Wellington Shires.

"This means that there are some restrictions about when and how you have a campfire. Restrictions apply both at your own property of if visiting any of our forested areas." Mr Owen said.
