Reasons to Celebrate Christmas

No. It is the man or woman who, despite the world's misuse and abuse of these, still strings up the Christmas lights, trims the tree and the turkey, turns up the carols, passes gifts to loved ones, sits down at table with family and friends, and flashes a grin to the world, who is radiating faith, who is saying that we are meant for more than gloom, who is celebrating Jesus' birth.

Thirteen students and three teachers left The Kildare campus very early on Saturday the 1st of December to participate in the 2019 Marist Cricket Carnival at Marist College, Ashgrove, Queensland.

Five days straight of fifty over cricket awaited the team and the boys, ranging from year nine to year eleven, were looking forward to playing against some of the best cricketers across the country and from New Zealand.

Whilst the weather in Traralgon failed to reach twenty degrees for the entire week, Ashgrove on the other hand, exceeded thirty-five degrees every day of the carnival. The team were certainly grateful for a day's acclimatization before the first ball was bowled.

STATE BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The last of our sporting events for 2019 year saw our Year 7 and Year 8 basketball teams travel to Albert Park to compete in the SSV State Championships at the Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre on November 18 and 19.

The two boy's teams were on the Monday and the Year 7 boys dropped their opening game against Warrnambool College 22-32 and suffered a heavy defeat to Berwick Secondary College in the next match. The boys finally secured a win in their final game against Catholic College Wodonga with a solid 53-32 triumph.

The Year 8 boys also dropped two games with a 28-45 loss to Emmanuel College, Warrnambool first up and then a narrow 30-40 loss to Berwick. Their sole win came in a 42-39 victory against Notre Dame College, Shepparton.

On the Tuesday, the Year 7 girls managed to secure two wins from their opening two games by edging past Emmanuel College 30-22 and getting over the top of Frankston High School 30-21. However, the girls fell significantly short against Catholic College Wodonga, losing 16-33.

The Year 8 girls were our best performers by advancing all the way through to the State Final. Lavalla edged past some quality opponents in Horsham College (31-24), Berwick (32-21) and Marian College, Myrtleford (32-25) to earn a shot at becoming State Champions. Unfortunately, they encountered Rowville Secondary College and succumbed to a 15-26 loss but it was a magnificent result in getting so far.

To be honest I don't even know what I was expecting, a parade of balloons to drop or maybe I was hoping that all of my problems would fade away in comparison to this amazing achievement, but none of that happened. Not even in my heart, I felt nothing I was shocked. This was a huge problem for me, and I needed to figure out why.

So, here was my thought process. Working hard is good, it is in fact biblical, but it should not be done for the sole purpose of a goals sake at the expense of relationship with others, and looking back on this year I realised that the stress of this year for

this goal was paid for with the lack of attending to relationships in my life. Well, lesson learned, and self-reflection accomplished.

An Australian End of Life Care Nurse commented, the number one regret of the dying is that they never lived life well enough. Were not happy often enough, did not focus on others enough and failed to enjoy life, instead just living the day to day.

So, fellow graduates, regret nothing in the 16th second or in your last second on earth. Go out and enjoy the world, make those you love smile and most of all make yourself the happiest person you can be.

Thank you all for coming tonight and for all the work that has gone into making this graduation special. And of course, to our fellow graduates.
