Easter

This is the last newsletter for the term and the last before Easter.

We are now in the period of time the Church recognises as Holy Week, which is the last week of Lent. It commenced on Palm Sunday, 28 March, and will conclude with the Triduum, which begins at sundown on Holy Thursday with the Mass of the Lord's Supper, continues with Good Friday and concludes with Easter evening prayer at sundown on Easter Sunday: its high point is the celebration of the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening.

Today at each campus we celebrated liturgies as part of our preparation for Easter Sunday, the most important feast of the liturgical year, where we celebrate the foundation of our faith, Christ's resurrection. During these liturgies our students, each in their own way, reflected an understanding of what it is for us to call ourselves an Easter people, those that live in the victory and hope of the resurrection and not the despair of crucifixion and darkness of a tomb.

Well done to all involved, but particular thanks to Robyn Rebbechi and Alex Rathbone for their work preparing the students who led us in these liturgies.

May the risen Christ of Easter, the one united fully in the life and love of God, who invites us to share this life and love with him, fill our hearts this Easter – and in leading us to a richer appreciation of life and love help us to radiate the peace and

joy of life to others. May our world become a more peaceful and loving place as a result of the effects of Easter on all people of good will.

Please find below an outline of my speech delivered at our open evening on Wednesday 31 March. Thank you for taking the time to explore the learning opportunities available to you at Lavalla Catholic College.

When choosing a school, you need to decide how well the school can cater to your child's individual needs. We believe Lavalla Catholic College does that better than any other school in Latrobe Valley.

Our Marist ethos guide the teaching philosophy at the College. We about inclusive, not exclusive education.

We commit to a six-year journey with you and your child to help them achieve their chosen pathway. Our focus is upon;

• Every student, every day, engaged in learning opportunities that allow them to improve to make wise choices for themselves.

The strategies that we have put in place to achieve our focus of every student everyday centres on three main areas

1. Knowing our students

- Building and maintaining relationships to ensuring that every student is named and known.
- The feedback provided by current students and parents is that our teachers and support staff make our student feel safe and supported.
- The relationships are developed upon mutual respect.

Knowing our students by being evidence informed. Starting where the student are at;

- Our inclusive education looks to cater to all students.
- As part of this, we need to understand where your child sits on the learning continuum.
- Learning is a journey and each child may start their journey from different points. Having evidence to understand this is vitally important.
- We identify where your child is on this journey and will help support and stretch them as they need.

2. Assess appropriately-

- Teacher observations and assessments form a crucial part of the learning journey.
- Through observation and feedback on assessments, we can make adjustments to ensure each child can grow and succeed no matter their level.
- Your child may need to be stretched in a particular subject but supported in another.
- In knowing our students, we can make this discernment and adjust assessments accordingly.

3. Know our impact-

- In measuring growth the focus is upon the individual student doing their best no matter their starting point.
- We also have a specific focus on ensuring there are numerous opportunities for extension across all subjects.

How do we achieve this?

- Pathways to meet the requirements of every child.
- Cater for students wanting to do medicine to gaining an apprenticeship

Year 7 and 8 - the foundation years – Specific programs aimed at continuing to build students' literacy and numeracy capacity.

- For example, our Renaissance reading program and Maths Pathway program assist in doing this.
- Students will also have a wide range of subjects to participate in, such as Religious Education, Science, Health and PE, Humanities, Technology (in the new technology centre), Music, Italian and Arts

Year 9 & 10 - provides numerous electives to start to explore pathways.

- The Careers team offers the support and guidance to assist your child in making this decision as they move in the senior years.
- VCE Enhancement opportunities- we currently have over 50 students doing a VCE or VET subject in Year 10.

VCE - Year 11 & 12-

- We have the greatest choice of VCE & VET subjects in Latrobe Valley.
- Catering to University and TAFE pathways
- In 2020 we had a student achieve a 99.6 ATAR (equal best in Gippsland), and over 13 students achieve above a 90 plus ATAR
- 92% of students received a first-round university offer in 2020

Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL)

- The VCAL program focuses on students who want to gain an apprenticeship, job or go to TAFE.
- In 2021 28 students gained an apprenticeship across a large number of trades.
- The Lavalla Catholic College VCAL program is a multiple state award-winning VCAL program. One of the best in Latrobe Valley.

We also focus upon developing the whole student via extra curricula- through RE retreats and immersions, Music programs, sporting opportunities and the sports enrichment program.

Working in partnership with parents

Working together to achieve success is vitally important.

We can keep you informed of your child's progress via a continuous feedback model. You can check your child's progress anytime as we use a Continuous feedback model. This is done via a Parent Access Module (PAM) You can see upcoming tasks, overdue tasks, task results, calendar events, excursion permission and attendance all in one place. Formal Semester Reports are provided twice per year. There are two Parent, Student, Teacher interviews one each semester. We also encourage your feedback to help us support your child's progress.

Finally, I would encourage you to speak to the student guides as they are our school's best advertisement.

Uniform

Tuesday 20th April until Friday 30th April – Transition to Winter Uniform.

This means that students can wear either winter or summer uniform during this time. However, from Monday 3rd May all students must wear the full winter uniform.

Please be aware that we will be placing a special emphasis on enforcing our College uniform policy from the beginning of term 2. Please ensure that all your children are wearing the correct uniform and adhering to the requirements around facial hair for boys, facial piercings, etc. Please check the Uniform Policy on the College website and in your Child's Planner if you have any queries.

Mobile Phones

Tuesday 20th April will be the start of our Mobile Phone Policy and Procedures, in line with every other school in Victoria. In short, mobile phones must be kept in a student's locked locker during the school day. A student may check their phone very briefly during recess and lunch at their locker.

If a student is found using their mobile phone outside of these times and places, the procedures will be implemented. Mobile Phone Procedures:

If a student is caught with their phone in class, at a College gathering or in the yard between 8.45am and 3.15pm, the phone will be confiscated by the staff member and handed to Reception at either Campus. The mobile phone must be placed in a sealed envelope and locked in the safe. Reception staff will record this by making an entry on SIMON.

- 1. The first time this occurs, the student can collect the phone at the end of the school day. The student must sign out the return of their phone in the Mobile Phone log book.
- 2. The second time this occurs, the student can collect the phone at the end of the school day and parents will be notified by SMS. The student must sign out the return of their phone in the Mobile Phone log book.
- 3. The third time this occurs, parents / guardians will be notified by the Wellbeing Leader / Head of House and a parent / guardian will be required to collect the phone at their earliest convenience.
- 4. The fourth time this occurs, parents / guardians will be notified by the Wellbeing Leader / Head of House and a parent / guardian will be required to attend a meeting with the Wellbeing Leader / Head of House to discuss their child's breach of the Policy and collect the phone. Additional consequences may be discussed at the meeting.

If a student is caught:

- Photographing, filming or streaming people without their knowledge or express permission or the consent of the College;
- Uploading or sharing any photos or video files to social media sites which bring the College or any College community member into disrepute or which may cause emotional or psychological harm;
- Sending harassing or threatening messages

The student's phone will be confiscated immediately and a fact finding process will be undertaken by the College. The College will apply appropriate consequences and pass information and the phone over to the police if the nature of the matter is illegal or if requested to do so by the police.

If, on any occasion, a student refuses to hand over their mobile phone when requested by a staff member, the staff member will request assistance from a senior member of staff. If a student still refuses to comply, parents / guardians will be contacted and required to collect their student from the College and make an appointment to resolve the issue.

Holy WEEK

In the week of 22 March, Lavalla Year 10 English classes participated in a Zoom meeting with the Melbourne Holocaust Centre.

The students were able to use this opportunity to understand the background of the texts that they would be studying in term 2. The staff and volunteers of the Centre presented a virtual tour of the

museum and the students were able to listen to the story and ask questions of a survivor of the Holocaust.

To hear what he had to go through at such a young age, normalising death around him, losing his family for years and how the only way to survive was purely based on luck. Term 1 Round Up

Despite a short, 5 day lockdown, it was otherwise exciting to see the full complement of scientific experiments running in classes this term. Year 7's learned how to use the Bunsen burner and how to separate mixtures using chemistry. The culmination of this will come next term when they will be challenged to



separate all the components of a mystery sample by designing their own procedure. The year 8's investigated the rock cycle in Geology, growing crystals and creating multimedia presentations to communicate the rock cycle. In year 9 electricity was the topic. Students explored circuits by moving through a self-directed booklet of inquiry activities and using our new 'Good Science' text book to consolidate this knowledge.

Senior students also hit the laboratory. For example, looking at the reactivity of metals (chemistry) the inheritance of genes (biology) and how CO2 traps heat (Enviro science). Our Environmental science students were also treated to an incursion organised by Ms McAllister where they learned about future technologies for managing CO2 emissions.

Our future students were also treated to a sample of these experiments, at the Lavalla open evening on Wednesday 31st March. Our science teachers enthusiastically encouraged all budding scientists to try out the activities and look at what science means at Lavalla.

EASTER MESSAGE 2021

Christ Is Risen!

Recently one of our beloved priests died. I was blessed to pray with him and his closest friends on that day. It was a sad, but beautiful occasion. As we sat around his bed, his friends shared their stories of how he had touched their lives; It was clear they loved him dearly and were grateful that he had been part of their family for so many years. It was clear to me he had loved them too and their presence brought him enormous reassurance.

As we talked, I could not help but think of the reality of the Paschal Mystery – dying and rising.

I reflected on this priest's life and wondered at all the Holy Thursdays, Good Fridays and Easter days he had celebrated. Just as I was about to leave he awoke unexpectedly! He gave me a huge smile and gave me his blessing – it was if heaven and earth met for those few minutes. He was ready and peaceful. He awaited that final breath when he would see God face-to-face.

It is no mistake that we see the reality of the paschal mystery all around us! The pattern of dying and rising. We see this across our beautiful diocese marked in the beauty of autumn and as we fast approach the cold winter – we do so in the knowledge of Spring days and Summer harvest. We experience this too in our lives – dying and rising – loving and letting go – remembering and living.

We are mindful of the suffering of those who have lived through the torrential rains and flooding waters and losses they face. Once again we see the goodness of so many who quickly come to the aide of friend and stranger with such compassion.

Our news reminds of us the deep yearning for peace in Myanmar and other countries where people live in turmoil. There are tragic stories of individuals whose lives are beset by the violence and whose vulnerability is exploited by others.

St Paul uses a beautiful ancient hymn in his Letter to the Philippians:

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God,
Did not count his equality with God something to be grasped.
Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave,
Coming in human likeness.
And being found in human form he humbled himself
And became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.

(St Paul to the Philippians 2:6-8)
