COVID-19 Safety

Thank you to all the staff, students and families for their support and cooperation recently in regard to the recent positive COVID-19 cases at the College. The result of these cases has meant that a number of students and some staff have needed to isolate.

Accordingly, it is essential that if someone is displaying any symptoms that they get tested as soon as possible and follow current heath directions. Additionally, it is still vital to:

- Wear a face mask as per current health directions;
- Perform regular hand hygiene, including on entry to, and exit from, the venue, and
- Maintain physical distancing, keeping at least 1.5m away from others at all times where possible.

Vaccination Requirements of Parents, Guardians and Carers and Other Visitors Attending Schools

Under the current Victorian Chief Health Officer's Directions all parents, guardians and carers who enter school buildings must be fully vaccinated or have a valid medical exception with the following limited exceptions:

- when attending to administer medical treatment to their own child when the treatment cannot be administered by the school
- when attending to collect their child who is unwell and cannot leave the school building unaccompanied by their parent/carer.
- when attending for a momentary period that does not involve any sustained contact with staff or students, for example, to collect a completed art project or similar.

All adults, including parents, guardians and carers attending any school event or activity including, but not limited to assemblies, tours, graduations, transition days or whole of school events are required to be fully vaccinated and show evidence of vaccination.


Meetings and other discussions (such as Student Support Group meetings) with parents, guardians and carers who do not meet vaccination requirements will be held virtually.

Parents, guardians and carers attending school sites for drop off and pick up who do not enter school buildings do not need to comply with vaccination requirements.

Ryan is currently the Deputy Principal at Marist College Canberra and has held this position since 2015. Prior to this Ryan was the Assistant Principal for four years at Trinity Catholic College Goulburn, NSW, and before that Head of House at St Edmund's College Canberra. Transition 2022

As 2021 draws to a close with Year 12 completing exams, we now look ahead to our Transition program to prepare students for the 2022 Academic Year. Headstart began on Monday November 22 for the 2022 Year 10 to 12 students. Teachers used the Staff Professional Learning Day on Friday, November 19, to update the curriculum with a particular focus upon Developmental Learning and to prepare for Transition.

During the Transition period, students will be participating in Progressive Achievement Testing (PAT), the results of which will provide valuable data to students and teachers to assess their progress and set goals for their future learning. Please find more information below about the Progressive Achievement Testing.

Progressive Achievement Testing

As part of our comprehensive student learning assessment program, all Years 7 to 10 students' literacy and numeracy skills are assessed annually with the Progressive Achievement Test. This year testing has been scheduled for Week 8 of this term, beginning November 22.

The school will use the PAT test data to celebrate learning growth over the last twelve months and identify students for learning support and extension They also inform the work of teachers in developing learning activities to meet the needs of all students in the classroom.

Never has this standardised testing been more important in ascertaining what our students know to ensure that we continue to meet their learning needs, especially after extended periods of remote learning.

Developed by the Australian Council for Education Research https://www.acer.org/au/pat is used widely by most primary and secondary schools to determine students' capacity against national benchmarks. These tests will measure their reading, writing, numeracy and vocabulary skills.

We ask for your support in partnering with us to ensure that your child understands how their test data will be used, that they approach them with confidence and view them as an opportunity to show us what they know and come prepared with fully charged devices to access the online platform.





Year 7 students recently completed a unit on ancient Egypt. Classes started with the Geography of Egypt with a focus on the importance of the Nile River. Students were then broken into 'expert groups' where they allocated a topic on an aspect of ancient Egypt.
